From Revd Graham Hedger



The story goes that in 1815 the nation waited anxiously for news of the outcome of the Battle of Waterloo. Across the south of England a series of towers had been erected for the new semaphore system. Eventually the message was relayed. 'Wellington defeated...' then the mist descended. Hearts sank. Eventually the mist cleared and the full message was seen. 'Wellington defeated Napoleon'.

Easter must have seemed like that to the early disciples. They had seen the joyous crowds on Palm Sunday and seen the events of what we call Holy Week, with encounters in the Temple and a special time together as they celebrated the Passover. During the meal Jesus had reminded them of what he had told them on many occasions—that he would die but that it was not the end.

But the weight of grief affected their ability to recall his words. They saw the mist and thought it was all over. So, imagine their surprise, confusion and delight when they encountered Jesus on Easter Day. At first, they didn't recognise him, perhaps that was their grief, or perhaps Jesus' risen body was different. But they soon became convinced that he was alive and were willing to take that message throughout the world, risking danger and even facing death to tell people that Jesus had conquered death.

It was three days that changed the world. Through his death and resurrection, the relationship between God and humankind was restored. The power of death was broken and those who have entrusted their lives to God find that even now they are beginning to enjoy a deep relationship with God, a foretaste of what is to come.

I hope that you will join with others throughout Holy Week as we remember the journey of Jesus from Palm Sunday to Good Friday and then on to the day of resurrection.

I wish you all a happy Easter.



DR STEPHEN BELL 1932—2019

I was amazed and humbled by the number of friends, relatives and neighbours who came to Steve's farewell service at All Saints Church on 6th March. Thank you so much.

I also wish to thank all of you for the great number of cards, letters and telephone calls of love, best wishes and support, including your many personal memories of Steve.

We have both been very fortunate in knowing so many wonderful people. Thank you again most sincerely.

Steve was an only child, born to devoted parents in 1932. They lived in Barrow-in-Furness. His early life was rather idyllic. There was a large family of close relatives, and a holiday home close by on Walney Island where the family would gather at weekends and for summer holidays.

In 1939 the war started and life in Barrow changed. The shipyard where the warships were being built was a major target for the German bombers. The houses of this close-knit family were successively destroyed by the bombing so the family became itinerant, moving in with one aunt, then another, until in Steve's words "we ran out of houses to live in". Extraordinarily, this extended family, now numbering twelve homeless people, passed round the hat to enable them to buy a small cottage in the Lake District—a ramshackle house with two bedrooms and a barn in Broughton.

Although the enforced break from formal education was short-lived, when Steve started at Grammar School he struggled and quickly recognised he had much catching up to do. He became bookish, widely read, and over his life picked up knowledge that included Cicero, the works of Churchill and became so fluent in French he preferred Maigret in the original, rather than the translation! A true polymath!

After university in Sheffield studying Chemistry, Steve began a career with the MOD in Waltham Abbey where he was required to become an inventor, starting with a recoil-less gun. In 1966 he went to Washington DC at the British Embassy and was there for three years developing programmes designed to help the US win the Vietnamese War. He was dedicated and passionate about the defence of the West and the threat from communism.

Steve and Barbara moved to Easton in the early 1980s and helped by their gardener, Fred Summers, joined in village life. House parties, often held at the height of the summer, filled the rooms with laughter and chat. These might occasionally be late affairs with the neighbours using the pool at midnight!

He became involved in the Bowls Club and was at one time Vice President. He was also a keen sailor. At one time he edited the village parish magazine.

This was a good period of life for them with a honeymoon in Brazil followed by luxury holidays to South Africa, New Orleans and to Canada visiting Barbara's family, as well as sailing adventures aboard his yacht, Deben Glen. They enjoyed opera, making frequent visits to Glyndebourne, Sadlers Wells and Covent Garden.

His son, Simon, characterises Steve's life as one of periods of happiness and challenges, one of which was when in June 2010 the thatch on the eastern section of The Old Kennels caught fire and half of the house was lost. He lost many treasured belongings, including 3500 books and his prized collection of 78rpm records. Yet, despite illness and such set backs, he pressed on, determined to make the best of things. A true stoic.

What emerges from this story is a man of remarkable fortitude; an intelligent man who read widely, developed himself intellectually through personal effort; a man who enjoyed life, had good friends, battled through many harsh challenges and who was, above all, a great conversationalist. A long standing friend of the family once described him simply as "an all round good bloke".

Easton Scam


A number of people have reported unsolicited phone calls saying that either their phone line or broadband was to be terminated later in the day unless they spoke to their technical department by pressing 1 on the phone pad. This is a scam.

The calls are pre-recorded and usually with a foreign accent, although one version is in well-spoken English. In some cases people have received up to four calls on the same day.

It is possible to block unwanted calls depending on your telephone provider. To discuss this, or if you have any concerns, contact your provider using the telephone number on a bill.

The TV licensing scam is going round again. Emails are sent regarding refunds and payments. They use headlines such as “correct your licensing information”, “billing information updates” and “renew now” to trick people into following a link within the email. This is sometimes followed up by a phone call by the fraudster claiming to be from the bank and persuading people to move money into a “safe” account. The money is never seen again. In December alone, 200 people nationally fell for this, losing £230,000.

The Story of a Mission : Part 8

We are indebted to Malcolm MacNicol for this fascinating insight to a 2nd World War bombing mission from Parham.



“At last the European coast appeared below and the long eye-aching hours of watchfulness were nearly over. We started letting down over the English Channel and as the English coast came in sight we were below oxygen altitude. Off came the oxygen masks and out came a long awaited cigarette. In another half-hour we were circling the airfield over Parham and peeling off to set down again on good solid ground. Our ground crews were waiting for us as we pulled into our hard standing, eager to hear our stories. There was much laughing, cigarettes and loud talk, then off to interrogation, where a shot of hot whisky, coffee and doughnuts awaited us, served by pretty Red Cross girls. How the Interrogation Officers ever got anything intelligible out of the excited babble of all the boys talking at once, coffee cups in hand, mouths full of doughnuts, I’ll never know. Then dead weary but relaxed, off to a hot meal, a hotter shower, maybe a letter home, still living in the present and immediate future, came blessed sleep. The sun was low in the afternoon sky as the thirty odd B-17s which had carried us over the target and back seemed already to be sleeping, oblivious to the ground crews swarming over them. Once again, they had performed the task for which they were built, and now, as long shadows crept along the ground, they rested quietly, as though storing up new energy for a repetition of the task tomorrow.”

Epitaph

The empty hard standings at Parham that evening, vainly waiting for their aircraft to come home, bore silent witness to the five planes and their crews the 390th Bombardment Group lost on the Magdeburg raid. The following day (29 May) they attacked aircraft factories at Leipzig, losing another two Fortresses. Staff Sergeant Robert Mygatt, the author of this story, survived the war.

From records kept by Staff Sergeant Robert Mygatt, a mid-upper gunner in a B17F Flying Fortress, flying daylight bombing missions from Parham deep into Germany between 1943 and 1945. Easton Ramblers Cricket Club

With grateful thanks to the assistance of Ben Reiss, The National Trust for Scotland, I am able to publish in our Parish Magazine some wonderful historical photographs of our Cricket Club.

These photographs have not been on public display before. They are reproduced under specific Copyright permission and were all taken by the Marchioness of Graham, Lady Mary Douglas-Hamilton in 1912/1913.

The Cricket Club was started by her husband, The Marquess of Graham, who provided the ground, the amazing clubhouse and other facilities. It was located in Kettleburgh Road near the corner with Framlingham Road. One photograph shows the round house lying between it and Framlingham Road. To do the photographs justice, I will produce them over a series.

The 1882 Auction of the 10th Duke of Hamilton's Art Collection—The Final 8 Days

The final eight days raised a total of £150,490 (£17,783,435 today).

The combined total of the whole 1882 Art Auction amounted to £397,562 (a staggering £46,979,986 today, based on the Bank of England Historical Inflation calculator).

Thirteen years later, on the death of the 12th Duke, despite owning properties and estates in various parts of the country, he left debts of £1million.to Alfred Douglas-Hamilton, the 13th Duke, a Lieutenant in the Navy. Alfred also inherited Hamilton Palace and its estates.

It was not therefore surprising that the Sale of the Easton Estate under the 12th Duke's will was used to help defray that burden. The Duke's luxury 186ft iron steam yacht, Thistle, was also sold to help defray the debts. His yacht was bought by H.I.M. Ex-Empress Eugénie of France, Napoleon III's wife.
