

With Spring on its way we start to think about getting out to walk in the beautiful English countryside again, but where to find new and interesting walks?

Walking in Suffolk has loads of walks to download and print, free, it also has books of walks, details of all the walking groups in the county and much more. Whether you want to walk on your own or with a group all the information is there in one place.

John Harris (who maintains the website) said 'There is so much walking information on the web but it is difficult to find. Walking in Suffolk (part of the Walking in England website) has brought it together in one place so whether you are walking from home, or away on holiday, you will be able to find a walk suitable for you'.

With walks from half a mile to twelve miles plus long, and a note of suitability for pushchairs and wheelchairs, everyone can find a walk to enjoy.

April in the Garden

Our spring has come at last with the soft laughter of April suns and shadow of April showers.

As the flowering trees begin to bloom and we cross our fingers for the gift of April Showers and warm sunshine, there is plenty to be getting on with this month. Do try to hold back on tender plants and seeds though as we could still get some frosts well into May.

The Ornamental Garden

Keep on top of the weeds. The easiest way to do this is to run a sharp hoe over the soil surface on dry days - the weeds will wilt and die off super quickly.

Tie climbing and rambling roses into their supports now whilst they are easy to access.

Direct sow hardy annuals such as marigolds, poppies and nigella straight into the flower border.

Harden off seedlings which were raised undercover by bringing them outside for the day to get them used to the cooler temperatures, putting them back inside in the early evening. Do this for a week or two before planting out permanently.

Now is the time to pot up Dahlia tubers. Keep undercover until after the last frost when they can be planted outside.

Finish planting summer flowering bulbs such as gladioli, acidanthera, lilies and crocosmia straight into the border.

Plant sweet peas out into the garden. They need a good, strong support to climb up - hazel and willow make perfect teepees.



Plant up hanging baskets and large containers, but keep them undercover until the threat of frost has passed.

Begin to stake perennials such as hollyhocks, echinacea and delphiniums to prevent damage from wind and rain later in the season.

The Kitchen Garden

Sow tomatoes, courgettes, sweetcorn, pumpkins, french and runner beans undercover.

Plant tomatoes, chili and sweet peppers and cucumbers in the greenhouse.

Plant maincrop potatoes giving them a good feed in the planting hole.



Begin regular feeding of citrus with a specialist citrus feed.

Direct sow leafy greens, roots and salads such as chard, spinach, carrots, beetroot, lettuce, radish into the vegetable garden.

Direct sow chives, coriander, dill, fennel, mizuna and rocket.

Mulch soft fruit with compost or manure to feed the soil and retain moisture.

I have long championed the need for brownfield development to be prioritised ahead of building on our precious Suffolk countryside and for planning decisions about new housing developments to be taken with our local communities at their heart.

It is because of my belief in protecting the countryside from overdevelopment that, a few years ago, I worked with other MPs to block suggested changes to the planning system. These changes would have potentially reintroduced a form of regionally set housing targets by the back door, as well as fast-tracked developments without proper local consultation or scrutiny. These changes were wrong and I am pleased to have played my part in stopping them.

However, the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, currently going through Parliament is different. The Government has listened to my views and is now set to reform the planning framework that will benefit local communities here in Suffolk.

A key part of the reforms will see a new development plan system being put in place at a local level, meaning that plans decided by local communities will be given much higher priority, with a presumption that the local plan must be followed unless there is a very strong reason to override it. This is a significant step forward given the amount of work that goes on in our local communities to inform local plans. I am also especially encouraged to see a "use it or lose it" clause being introduced, which will prevent developers from stockpiling land and gaming the system. In future developers will lose their planning consent unless they proceed to develop the site in a timely manner.

Suffolk's towns and parishes already have the power to develop their own neighbourhood plans. Thanks to these important reforms, topdown regional housing targets will be a thing of the past, and Whitehall civil servants, many of whom have never set foot in Suffolk, will lose the power to impose massive new housing developments on our area. These new reforms will also help to increase the accessibility of neighbourhood planning by allowing Parish Councils to produce simpler, easier to produce 'neighbourhood priorities statements', which will undoubtedly be welcome news to our hardworking local Parish Councils.

Whilst I welcome these positive reforms, I am continuing to fight for new laws to allow a community right of appeal against a planning decision. Currently, developers have the right to appeal but communities do not. It is time to level the playing field. Bad planning decisions need to be challenged, and residents deserve the right to do so.

Finally, I am pleased to see that, under the proposed reforms, new Local Plan Commissioners will be introduced to support or, if councils fail in their statutory duties, to take over plan-making, in tandem with a new set of measures to increase the effectiveness of planning enforcement.

These new planning reforms are an important step in the right direction, and I shall continue to do all that I can as an MP to ensure our local councils have better tools to make the right planning decisions in the future.



Neighbourhood Watch News for April

You will have seen on the news that the NHS has approved a weight loss drug, administered by injection and based on semaglutide. The drug makes people feel fuller, so they eat less, and are not as hungry. As this is currently topical the Consumer Association have issued a warning on an email that is currently circulating promoting a weight loss pill.

Figur diet pill email scam

This scam email uses Dragons' Den branding to trick you into believing that the product is legitimate. It begins by stating: 'Miracle weight loss pill that naturally burns fat nets biggest deal in Dragons' Den History' and includes a photo of Deborah Meaden.

The message features another outlandish claim – that women lose an average of one and a half stone in a month by using Figur pills. At the bottom of the email, you're prompted to click on a button stating 'Go to Figur special offer now'. Claiming 'offers' are time-limited is a common tactic used by scammers to get victims to act quickly. If you click on the link, you'll be taken to a webpage where you'll be asked to fill out your age, gender, current weight and goal weight. The page includes a countdown clock and fake reviews about the pills. Once you add your details, you'll be taken to a purchase page where you'll be asked for your payment details. Enter them and you'll be giving your money to the scammer, with no guarantee an item will ever arrive.

Suspicious websites such as this may also attempt to steal your bank details or download malware on to your device.

This email peddles Figur diet pills, but there have also been messages advertising similar Liba pills.

The BBC confirmed that this email is in no way linked to Dragons' Den or Deborah Meaden.

Amazon - Remote Access Scam

Which has previously reported on remote access scams, where people are contacted out of the blue and tricked into downloading software that grants fraudsters access to their computers. In the worst instances, victims have seen their bank accounts emptied by scammers.

Remote access scams can start with unsolicited calls, texts or browser pop-ups. This scam call will come from an unrecognised number. When you answer, the fraudster will tell you that your Amazon Prime subscription is increasing in price or is about to expire.

If you say that you want to cancel your subscription, you'll be put through to another fraudster. They will tell you that you need to download remote access software (typically the app 'AnyDesk'). This is a genuine program that fraudsters sometimes look to exploit as a vehicle for their scams.

Once you've downloaded the program, you'll asked to give them the address (code) and this will grant the scammer access to your device - allowing them to steal your personal information or install malware.

Amazon confirmed to Which that it will never ask customers to provide remote access to their devices or make any payments outside of its website.





Cherry Plum

In late February/the beginning of March the lanes and hedgerows of Easton are peppered with the early blossom of Cherry Plum – like a dusting of icing sugar.



Cherry Plum or Myrobalan – Prunus *cerasifera* is the earliest 'plum' to flower, preceding the blackthorn, damson and wild plum. It has been bnown in cultivation since Tudor times and often used as a stock for domestic plums. It is often planted in and around gardens and orchards, provid-

ing a quick growing and attractive hedge. The early flowers are a valuable source of early pollen and nectar for bees and provided they are not frosted yield mirabelles which range in colour from golden yellow, red and purple. The mirabelles have long stalks like cherries. but taste 'plummy' - hence the name **Cherry Plum.**


