'FAREWELL' DEIRDRE

Deirdre's final service as Priest-in-charge of the Benefice of Orebeck was held at Brandeston on Sunday 16th July with Deirdre herself presiding. With a little assistance from the large congregation, the choir opened the proceedings with the introit 'Broken for me, broken for you'. Deirdre Parmenter gave the first reading from the section of Ephesians which talks mainly about Christ as head of the Church and how He confers on His followers spiritual gifts to act in His name; Harry Edwards read the Beatitudes from the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel.

In his sermon Robin Alderson then tied these readings together using the theme of what we need to hear and looking forward to achieving our objectives. He then neatly linked all this in to Deirdre's approach to achieving her objectives in unifying the seven parishes in the benefice.

The hymns, all chosen by Deirdre, were 'In Christ alone my hope is found'; 'It is a thing most wonderful'; 'God of grace and God of glory' and 'Lord, for the years'. The prayers were led by the Lay Elders. Finally, as a farewell, the choir sang John Rutter's 'A Clare Benediction'.

All in all a very moving but, at the same time, very joyous occasion.

After the service at Brandeston, the congregation joined those at the Sunday Cafe in the Village Hall at Easton to say *au revoir* to Deirdre.

Lord Marlesford reminded us of the evolution of, and Deirdre's contribution to, the formation of our Orebeck Benefice. He thanked Deirdre, alluding to her previous careers, and wishing her well in her next one after her official retirement. He presented her with vouchers and a cheque and she also received a bouquet of flowers. We all toasted her in Pimms and Deirdre thanked us and spoke of her conviction that God will be with us as we face the future together.





Suffolk Historic Churches

Another year — Another Ride and Stride!

Saturday 9th September 2017

9.00 am to 5.00 pm

The Annual Sponsored Ride & Stride is a national event and every second Saturday in September cyclists and walkers all round the country are out making money for their local county Churches Trust.

The idea started in Suffolk, and consistently Suffolk has headed the table of funds raised. The Ride & Stride is the main source of income to Suffolk Historic Churches Trust to enable it to make grants to churches and chapels of all denominations towards repair and restoration costs.

The Ride & Stride is run entirely by volunteers with cyclists and walkers invited to seek sponsors who will undertake to pay an agreed sum of money for each place of worship visited by them between 9.00 am and 5.00 pm on Ride & Stride Day. The money raised by each participant is shared equally between the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust and the place of worship nominated by the cyclist. As important as the cyclists are the many volunteers who give up time during the day to man the churches and chapels and sign in the cyclists as they arrive. Hundreds of places of worship are manned and that takes quite a team of volunteers! It is a real community effort that is the lifeblood of the Trust.

Messages from Action Fraud

Fake BT bill contains banking malware

A new fake email claiming to be from BT is attempting to trick victims into automatically downloading Dridex banking malware.

The emails entitled 'New BT bill' contain a link that automatically downloads a malicious file called 'BT bill.zip' once clicked. What makes this scam email unique is the Dridex malware starts downloading without a webpage being opened.

Once installed, the Dridex malware steals personal information such as user names and passwords by eavesdropping, with the ultimate goal of getting into bank accounts and stealing cash.

If you receive one of these emails do not click on any links. Instead, go to the BT website directly and log in from there to view your bills. BT would never send you an email with an attachment.

Remember that fraudsters can "spoof" an email address to make it look like one used by someone you trust. If you are unsure, check the email header to identify the true source of any such attachment or link.

Additionally you should always update your anti-virus software and operating systems regularly.

WhatsApp Users

Fraudsters are sending out messages claiming to be from WhatsApp in order to steal banking and personal information. Here is why they might catch people out.

Long term users of WhatsApp will remember paying a 99p annual fee to use the messaging service. In 2016 this was scrapped by Facebook who bought the company for over £11bn. Since 2016 the service has been free for every user.

Whilst late adopters of the service might look at the email and simply brush it off, long term users will remember paying and could quite easily think the app has gone back to its subscription model and get caught out. The emails claim your "subscription will be ending soon" and are after your banking information. We have been getting an increasing number of reports about them over the past couple of days.

Fraudsters have realised that this is a clever way to dupe people and earlier this month we warned people about the same style of WhatsApp subscription message being sent by text. Last year users were being tricked into downloading a fake 'gold' version of WhatsApp which infected Android devices with malware.

If you receive one of these emails or text messages, do not click on any links. Instead, delete it and if you have clicked on one of the links, run anti-virus software to ensure your device has not been infected with malware.

Warning about 'Nottingham Knockers' (Door to Door Scammers)

Suffolk Police and Trading Standards are warning residents to be mindful of so-called 'Nottingham Knockers' working in the area. They have recently been cold calling in Suffolk.

A group of young salesmen, historically dubbed the 'Nottingham Knockers', often operate in our part of the county. Named after a scam originating in Nottingham in the 1970's, young people travel across the UK targeting a town at a time. They knock at doors and claim to be ex-convicts attempting to mend their ways, before trying to sell the householder everyday household products at very high prices.

Police always advise residents to refrain from buying at the doorstep and not to buckle to pressure from sales people offering supposedly one-off 'buy it now' low prices. However, often kind-hearted residents feel they are helping the 'Nottingham Knockers' to turn their lives around so agree to buy their wares.

These so called 'Nottingham Knockers' work in groups across the country but they are not involved in any officially recognised 'offender rehabilitation programme' and many do not possess Pedlar's Certificates, which are issued by police and are necessary for sales people to be legally allowed to sell door-to-door. Sympathetic members of the public are being duped into buying cheap products at highly-inflated prices.

These young people are normally wearing some form of identity badge, which is not a lawful substitute for being in possession of a valid 'Pedlar's Certificate,' relating to the door to door sales person. Please also note however that having a Pedlar's Certificate is in no way an indication that the goods for sale are of merchantable quality.

The advice is to dial the police on 101 if you have a suspicious caller.

More on the History of the Hamilton Family
by
Brian Boon
 (Easton was under their tenure for 92 years)

Sporting Life at Easton Mansion, 1897

After the 12th Duke's death in 1895, the Duchess continued to enjoy her hunting and shooting. The following account is as recorded by Edward Lindley Sambourne, diarist, cartoonist and illustrator for the satirical magazine Punch for more than 40 years. He lived at 18 Stafford Terrace, Royal Borough of Kensington & Chelsea, now a museum.

Sunday January 10th 1897 – *Sambourne was travelling in a carriage with one other person on route to Great Bromley Lodge, who 'kindly told me of Easton Park belonging to the Duke of Hamilton. Out at Ardleigh. Trap there and on to Great Bromley Lodge. Hamilton rather dull.' Sambourne stayed there, leaving the next day and arrived at Easton Park in time for dinner.*

Tuesday January 12th – *'Easton Park, Up at 8.20. Dressed. New shooting suit on & leather w. After off by 9.45 to shoot. Guns Lucas, Welsh, Captain Kennedy, self. Mr Hardy, Mr Duff & Squire Austin. Large cover. Large shoot before lunch. Trouble to avoid shooting hen pheasants. Boy in glasses carried cartridges. A 'hass'. Lunch in tent. Ladies joined us. Everything hot. After again cover shoot, finished up with driven partridges. Got 3. Tea. 8.0pm went to the Dining Drawing Rooms. Took Mrs Lucas in to dinner. Claret. After, roulette won and also divided a pool. All back but 5s. Bed 12.15 Read to 1.15am Good night. Parham Wood shoot. 70 pheasants, 12 parts, 24 hares, 158 rabbits, 1 woodcock, 2 various. 256 total.'*



Wednesday 13th January – 10.0 a.m. 15.

Estate Gamekeepers*



A luncheon tent at Easton Park*

Dressed in brown suit. Breakfast. Changed waistcoats and off by 9.50am. Had some good shooting in the morning and got many cock pheasants..... Cold. Last drive. Walked back. Dressed leisurely and dined at 8.0pm. Asked to have wine warmed.'

Thursday 14th January – *Sambourne left 8.25am and returned home.*

Tuesday 26th October 1897 – ‘Easton Park. Up and breakfast at 9.0. Off to shoot at 10.0. Guns Capt. Haworth Savage, Capt. Elkington, Sir William Priestley, self, Col. Lucas, Gerald Walsh and another.... Partridge drive Ladies joined us for lunch. Felt seedy at lunch. Rested for 2 hours before dinner. Took Claret. Went up to bed.’

Wednesday 27th October – ‘Up at 8.10 and off in break at 9.15, 7 miles drive for shoot. (At this point felt sick & faint and had to go and lie down.) Got 3 or 4 partridges also plenty of pheasants. Felt unaccountably sick and seedy all day with colly wobbles. ... left at 4.45 and long drive home. (*Note: a draw always took place for female guest to accompany to dinner.*) Did not enjoy dinner at all. Bed early. Heard all hours strike from 3.0am to 8.0am.’

Thursday 28th October – ‘A lovely day. Lunch in a moated farm house. All the ladies there. Very careful I took only biscuits & weak whiskey & soda. Dinner took Mrs Lucas in & pleasant talk of Prince Imperial etc.’

Friday 29th October – *Sambourne was up early and off in ‘buss’ for London in foggy weather.*

He subsequently returned to Easton Park in January 1900, January 1901, January 1902, December 1903 and January and December 1905.

How long have you lived in Easton?

The job I have now! I should have retired, but I work longer hours than ever before and I love it! I rear 30,000 pheasants and partridges between May and September before moving them onto land at Iken. We then sell 22 days of shooting to clients all over the country. Every day is different, I don't have to clock-watch, I see something different and interesting in the countryside every day.

Have you ever lived in another country?

No.

My greatest strength is ...

Running my business successfully. Also I have been Captain of Easton Bowls Club for 20 years and won the league numerous times, so I must be doing something right!

My greatest weakness is ...

Not being able to say no! Agreeing to do work which I don't have time for.

My favourite TV programme is ...

I don't watch a lot of television, but I do like football and enjoy watching the team I support, Norwich City, play. I also like Countryfile.

My favourite book ever is ...

I don't have a favourite book, as I am not a great book lover, but I do love to read the East Anglian Daily times from cover to cover every day.

If you could pass any law you would ...

Bring back fox hunting. Controversial I know, but the number of foxes we now have (who have no natural predators) often decimate the birds I rear. I would also ban large lorries from passing through villages such as ours.

My favourite places in the UK (other than Easton!) are ...

Yorkshire and the New Forest. Many happy memories and I love the beautiful countryside and laid back people in both areas.

The best days of my life are ...

Spending time with my family. I have three children and four grandchildren.
