



Re-Cycling Bins at the Car Park

The Parish Council would like to thank all of those who gave their views and accounts, regarding the Re-Cycling bins following the Parish Council decision to remove them from the Car Park. This decision was based on the nuisance reported and suffered by local residents. The Parish Council has worked very hard to try to find a solution. In the summer the Parish Council spoke to SCDC, they explained that due to financial pressures the collection of the bins could not be altered, ie early morning and two weekly collections. They were made aware of the over-spill and problems surrounding this.

When SCDC understood the decision that had been made and circumstance of the decision, along with the responses from members of the community, SCDC offered and agreed to collect the bins after 8am in the morning, that they would be emptied on a weekly basis, and that if there were incidences of over-spill and boxes and bags of bottles along with loose bottles on the ground, that the following morning on from glass collection, an operative would be sent to collect the cardboard, bags and rubbish left.

The arrangements now in place for the Re-Cycling bins has improved the position of the bins at the Car Park. The Parish Council will, with this knowledge, re-visit the subject at the next PC meeting in January with the real option of Re-Cycling bins remaining at the Car Park without problems. The landscaping that had originally been planned, to provide a fenced bay with climbing plants and on hardstanding to contain the bins and any broken glass, will also be re-visited.

AN UNTIMELY DEATH A LONG WAY FROM HOME (WW1 Soldier from New Zealand buried in our cemetery)

Recently checking old Burial Records for Easton All Saints Church at the Wickham Market Archives, I found the following:-

15/9/1918, LANDER, George Keeble, 30
of Military Hospital, Tidworth, Hants,
70824, Private, Canterbury Regiment, New Zealand.

I wondered for a minute if he might have died in the Auxiliary Hospital which for a time was based at The Mansion, but no. A search of the New Zealand Archives on military service reveals his full Service history.

He was enlisted on 25/9/1917 and service commenced 12/11/1917 when he was posted to 37th Specialist Company. On 16/5/1918 he embarked on IONIC No 104 Troop ship at Wellington and disembarked London on 7/7/18. He was stationed at Tidworth Barracks, Hampshire. On 22/8/1918 he was admitted to Tidworth Military Hospital, suffering from Bronchitis. On 3/9/1918 he was placed on the dangerously ill list and on 15/9/1918, he died of Broncho Pneumonia.

He was then transferred to Easton for a private interment in our cemetery. His Aunt, Mrs R W Richardson, lived at Park Cottage, School Lane, Easton and is mentioned on the document detailing his death. His parents lived at Southbrook, Rangiora, Canterbury, New Zealand. It also notes the 'Officiating Clergyman [was] Rvd. A. Collick'.

Be Aware of Pickpockets

With the January sales upon us, it's easy for pick-pockets and shop-lifters to conceal themselves amongst the crowds in shopping areas at this busy time of year.

Often working in pairs or groups, pickpockets will use various ways to lift your purse or wallet out of your pocket or bag.

One can purposely bump into you, or sometimes distract you, while another will adeptly help themselves to your money and cards. You may not feel them stealing from you.

In order for shoppers to protect themselves, police offer the following advice:

- Keep your bag closed and close to you at all times, if possible with the opening towards your body
- Close your purse and put it away before you leave the till
- Try not to overload yourself with bags and coats
- Avoid carrying your purse or wallet in a back trouser pocket
- Keep cash secure and out of sight.

Do not leave your handbag, push chair or shopping trolley unattended for *any* length of time

Shoppers should also remember not to leave any goods on display in their vehicles and they should if possible keep them locked away securely in the boot of the car and out of sight.

Keep Your Oil Safe

As the weather turns more wintry, Suffolk Constabulary is offering advice and crime prevention visits to help keep your heating oil secure.

In 2016 there were 70 incidents of heating oil theft. So far in 2017 there have been 52 cases reported.

General tips to protect your fuel include:

- Check oil levels frequently so you are aware if anyone has tampered with your supply, and consider an electronic oil level gauge which sets off an audible alarm in your house if the oil level drops below a quarter full.



- Fit a good quality locking device to all fuel tanks – a high quality closed shackle padlock will make access using bolt croppers very difficult.
- Consider perimeter security for the whole tank, such as a metal cage or fencing. Even a prickly hedge may help deter thieves. Remember however that the oil tanker driver will need to access it.
- If you're installing an oil tank or considering repositioning it, they should ideally be situated within sight of nearby occupied buildings. It may not be so aesthetically desirable, but the more remote the better the opportunity to access the tank without being seen.
- Consider appropriate lighting around the tank so you can see and anyone can be seen.
