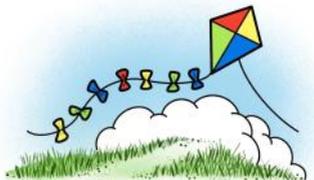
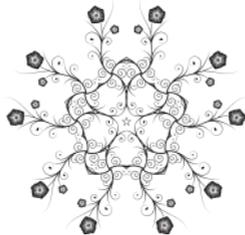

From Revd Graham Hedger



The good news is that at last we are able to re-open our churches albeit in a limited way. Opening up a church building, which is also a listed ancient building, comes with a raft of guidance and rules. I and all the church wardens across the benefice are very grateful to the many people who have come forward to help with the task of cleaning the church buildings to enable them to open and then also taking on the task of monitoring and daily cleaning.

Under government regulations, places of worship may now re-open for private prayer, providing certain conditions are met. Each church council has made a decision based on those regulations.

The following churches are open for private prayer from Sunday 21st June :

Brandeston: daily; 10am - 4pm

Kettleburgh: daily; 8am - 6pm

Marlesford: Sunday 11am - 6pm, Wednesday 8.30am - 6pm

From 1st July:

Easton: Tuesday and Saturdays only, 10 am to 4 pm

The remaining churches will re-open at a later date. Other changes that have been introduced mean that we are now able to have small, socially distanced funerals in churches, but there is no word on when we will be able to return to Sunday services, or weddings and christenings.

Sunday worship continues online and there is now a monthly Taizé service on YouTube. produced by the Rev'd Wendy Gourlay from Cretingham.

Church services and open churches

Following guidance from the government our churches have been closed for many weeks. Based on the Covid Recovery strategy it is unlikely that churches will be open before July at the earliest. At the moment there are people working out what needs to be done to open churches safely, either as places of prayer or for services. Only when directed by the government, the Archbishop of Canterbury and our Diocesan Bishop will we be able to re-open our churches. Before they open, the church councils will need to satisfy a number of steps to ensure the safety of all who enter. This means that at the moment we can only do funerals with limited numbers, either at the graveside or the crematorium and we are not permitted to do weddings or baptisms.

We continue to publish daily services on the Hacheston Church website www.hachestonchurch.onesuffolk.net/services These can be downloaded and many of us stop each day at 9.30am and 4pm to say our prayers. There is also a Sunday service on Zoom at 9.30am. The congregation is growing every week. If you would like to join the service please contact Bill Clarke (bill78@btinternet.com) to get the link. In order to preserve the security of the service we don't publish the link.

For those with computers and internet access:

- Morning prayer is streamed from the Bishop's Chapel via the Bishop's Facebook page [@BishopsCofEsuffolk](#)
- Evening Prayer is streamed from the Cathedral via the Cathedral's Facebook page [@Stedscathedral](#)
- A special Sunday service is streamed from the Cathedral
- Radio 4 longwave broadcasts a daily service
- On Sunday, Songs of Praise is on BBC 1 and a morning service on Radio 4 and Radio Suffolk.

Daily Hope T: 0800 804 8044

Daily Hope is a free phone line which offers a simple ministry to those who might struggle to access services and prayers online. We know churches across the country have risen to the challenge of engaging many creatively online with worship and prayer during lockdown. We were also aware that this also highlighted the 'digital divide' between those for whom the online world comes easily and others for whom it is inaccessible and alien. We know that less than a quarter of over 75 year olds regularly engage in online platforms and so wanted to make sure they weren't excluded from worship in a time of isolation.

That's where Daily Hope comes in. Daily Hope is an example of a great working together across the church - backed by the Archbishops' Council - to deliver a solution to a real need. Specialists whose vocation is to minister amongst 'seniors', those who have got great tech skills, liturgists and musicians, those from Comms and the Evangelism and Witness team at Lambeth Palace gathered together at the beginning of April to see if they could make this happen. **On 26 April the free phone line was launched. The line offers each caller a number of options – a collection of well-known hymns, the stories behind the hymns, joining in with Morning or Evening Prayer, or receiving the latest relevant public health advice.**

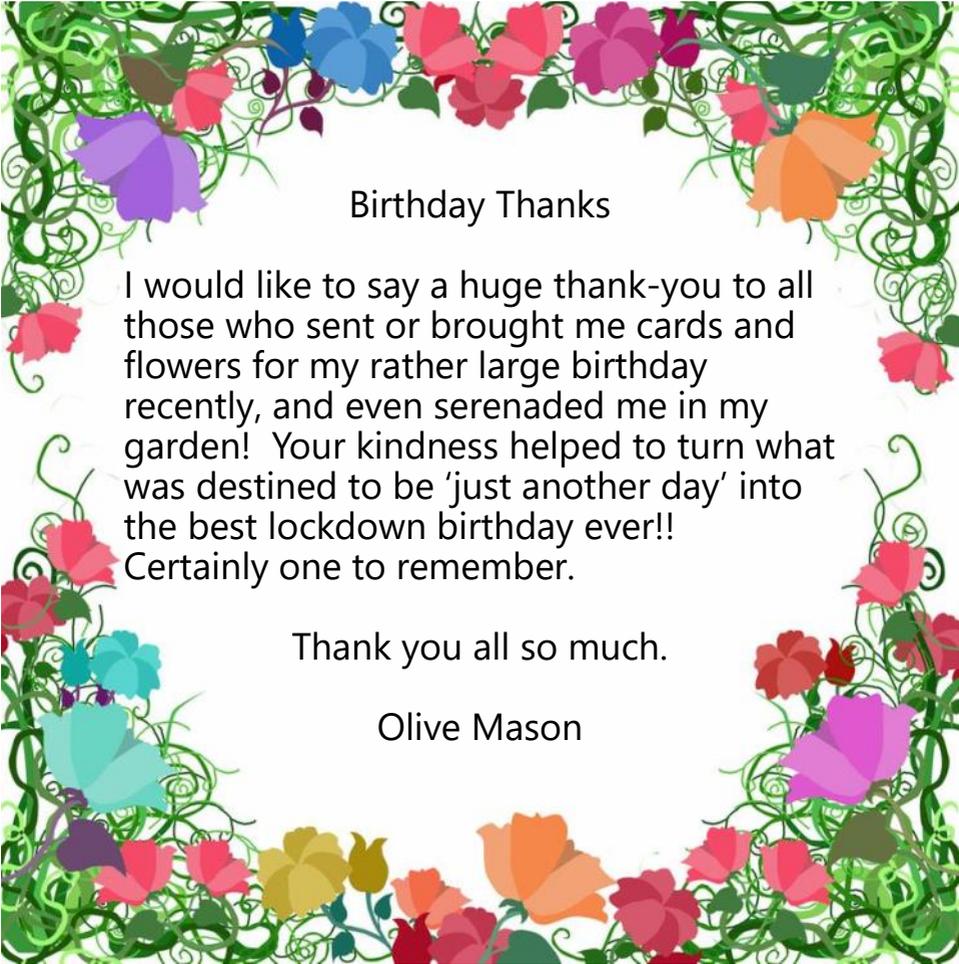
Since it launched Daily Hope has received over 150,000 calls totalling 1.7 million minutes from nearly 38,000 unique callers. Callers receive a welcome from Archbishop Justin and then a series of options.

Feedback has been hugely positive. For example:

My mum is 89 and suffers from macular degeneration. She is living alone nearly 200 miles from us, without internet access, and, like many at this time, is feeling extremely depressed and isolated. A few weeks ago I told her about the phone line 'Daily Hope'. I can't begin to tell you how much she appreciates this initiative. It has brought her such comfort, and I know that she spends many hours listening to it, particularly in the night when she's unable to sleep.

Stories like this make it all worthwhile.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Avoid scoring a cyber own goal when streaming Premier League

Football fans have been warned of cyber threats when they swap their tickets for TV subscriptions – and been advised how to watch behind-closed-doors games as safely as possible.

As well as illegally watching the game the victim has paid for, the hackers could make unauthorised purchases on the platform or look to find personal information that could be used for further scams – including targeting them with scam emails or phone calls.

National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) Chief Executive Officer Ciaran Martin said:

“The return of the Premier League is a moment that the nation has been looking forward to, and we want football fans to enjoy it in the safest way possible.

Without the option of watching football matches at the pub or in person, it’s fantastic that technology can bridge the gap and allow thousands of fans to watch their team from their own living room. We would strongly recommend fans check out the government’s Cyber Aware campaign to ensure they have as safe a streaming experience as possible.”

Last year the NCSC exposed the most compromised passwords in the world – with 23.2 million accounts breached by hackers guessing the password ‘123456’.

The organisation also revealed hundreds of thousands of compromised accounts were protected using popular football team names (liverpool 280,723; chelsea 216,667; arsenal 179,095; manutd 59,440 and everton 46,619).

With the season now back, fans can secure their viewing experience by:

- **Refreshing accounts:** It’s a great time for fans to consider resetting their password. We’re increasingly seeing hackers use credentials stolen in past security incidents to hijack streaming accounts using the same compromised details. If you’re using the same password for your sports streaming accounts that you’ve used multiple times in the past – it’s time for a reset.



- **Setting a strong password:** We recommend using a password that's separate to your email password and made up of three random words.
- **Updating streaming apps:** Cyber criminals exploit weaknesses in apps to access your sensitive personal data. Providers regularly issue patches to these exploits in updates – you're vulnerable without them so we urge every fan to make sure their streaming apps are updated. To make it simple going forward, we recommend turning on automatic updates.

Police & Suffolk Trading Standards are urging residents to remain vigilant of telephone scams after an elderly victim fell victim to an Amazon telephone scam.

Suffolk Trading Standards has issued the following guidance - Beware of telephone calls being made by fraudsters pretending to be from Amazon.

We've had reports of calls being made from individuals claiming your Amazon Prime subscription is due to expire, and will be automatically taken from your account. The recorded message asks you to press 1 to cancel or to speak to customer services. The call then goes through to an individual who "requires" your personal details.

Another scam call claims that your Amazon Prime account is being cancelled and that bank details are required to refund this.

If you receive a call, claiming to be from Amazon, HANG UP!

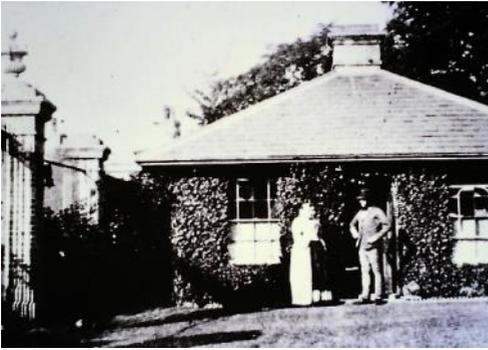

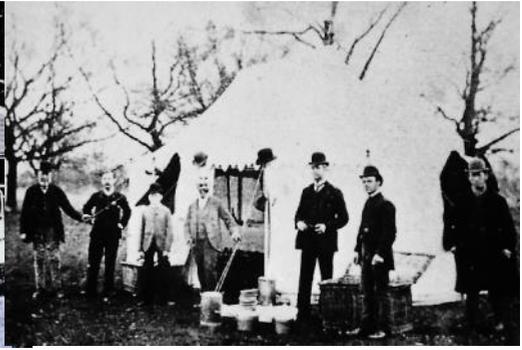

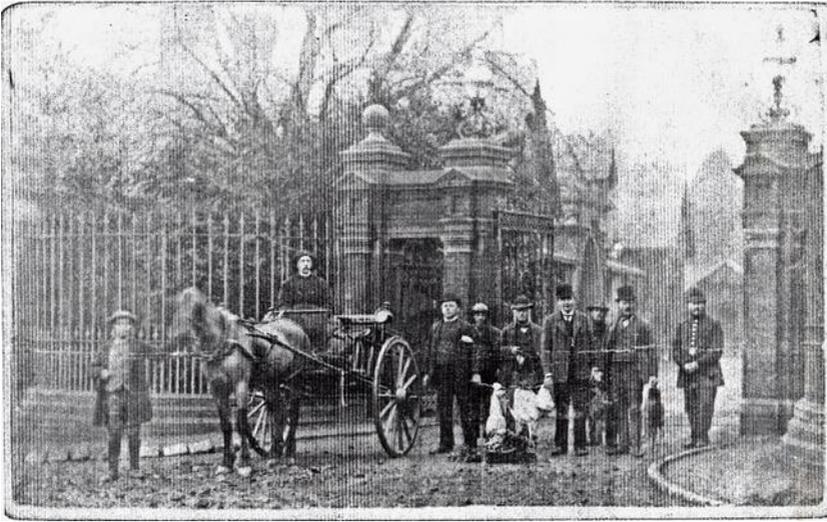

Dear Local Resident,

I hope my letter finds you and your families safe and well.

Infection rates and deaths from COVID-19 in Suffolk have fallen and continue to fall. This is good news, but there is still a long way to go in our fight against the virus. We are likely to be living with COVID-19 for many more months, if not years. We must continue to adapt accordingly.

Some of the early restrictions have now been lifted but many of us continue to work from home. Some shops and businesses that were temporarily closed have reopened. Children have started to return to school, although a full reopening of schools will take some time. We are now starting to be able to see our loved ones and friends, albeit in a safe and controlled way.

The restrictions on our daily lives have been critical in slowing the spread of the pandemic and must continue, but our attention must now also turn to protecting jobs and enabling our economy to slowly recover. Non-essential shops have been allowed to open again from 15th June, along with a number of other outdoor businesses. From 4th July, assuming that infection rates continue to fall, it is likely that pubs and other parts of our hospitality industry will be able to start to welcome back customers. This is welcome news, but it is vital that the social distancing and hand hygiene measures must continue to be followed in order to prevent a second wave of the virus.

Whilst I continue to work part-time as a doctor in our NHS, on the frontline of the fight against COVID-19, my work as your Member of Parliament continues and I shall continue to regularly update you on the latest health advice, and the other forms of support available to you, your families and local businesses during these unprecedented times.

Health Advice:

As some aspects of our lives return to being closer to how they were before the pandemic started, it remains vitally important for all of us to play our part to help prevent the spread of the COVID-19 virus:

- Social distancing (keeping at least 2 metres apart from people who are not from your own household) helps to protect each other and reduces the spread of the virus;
- Good hand hygiene (for example, thorough washing your hands and wrists for about 20 seconds before eating and when returning home after leaving the house) is particularly important to protect yourself from catching the virus;
- To protect others, it is important NOT to leave home if you or anyone in your household has Coronavirus symptoms (and also to seek further medical advice)

Important Local News:

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, my office and I have continued to work hard on behalf of everyone in Central Suffolk and North Ipswich, helping people to access personal and business financial support, and also helping a great many people who were stranded overseas as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic to return home. I continue to ask probing Parliamentary questions of our Government about its response to the Coronavirus pandemic and continue to raise the issues that matter to us here in Suffolk in Parliament and directly with Government ministers.

There has been much interest in the matter of food safety and animal welfare standards and a number of you may have already been in touch with me directly. Contrary to some media speculation that UK food standards will be lowered as part of future trade deals with the USA or other countries, I want to reassure you that this is not the case. In Suffolk, we are very proud of our high standards of locally produced food and drink, as well as of our high animal welfare standards. It is important in any potential future trade deal that UK farmers are treated fairly by sharing a level playing field with farmers from overseas, and that everyone must adopt the same high standards of food quality as UK farmers.

I have been reassured that the Government is actively engaging with farmers and the agricultural sector to ensure that we fully support our food producers as part of any future trade discussions. Locally, I meet regularly with farmers and the National Farmers Union and will always act in their best interests. I shall continue to do all that I can to support them and to ensure the highest standards for food consumers.

Some people have also been in touch with me regarding the continuation of free school meals during the school summer holidays to support the most vulnerable in our communities. I too share these concerns which is why, together with a number of other MPs I successfully lobbied the Government to continue providing funding throughout the summer holiday period to enable the poorest and most vulnerable children in our area to receive the food and support they need during this difficult time

So, I am pleased that our Prime Minister has listened and is setting up a COVID Summer Food Fund. There will now be a food voucher scheme to cover the entire six-week summer holiday period for pupils who already qualify for free school meals.

Summary:

In closing, I would like to thank you for your continued patience and commitment during these challenging times but ask that you continue to follow the Government advice so that we do not risk a second wave of infection. A second wave would have devastating consequences for our NHS and for our economy. In my view, it is essential that we continue to be led by the scientific evidence, which dictates which restrictions can start to be lifted and when.
