





Fake Evri delivery text scam

Delivery company Evri, formerly Hermes, is being impersonated by fraudsters asking for bank details to pay a fake delivery fee. It asks the recipient to visit a website to pay a £1.45 shipping fee, and if they don't pay, the parcel will be returned to the sender.

It's likely that the scammers are mass targeting victims. However, it can be persuasive if you're waiting for a package to arrive. An example of the text:

Text Message
Today 02:48

Evri: Your parcel has a £1.45 shipping fee, to pay this now visit: evri-delivery-fees.com. Failure will result in your parcel being returned to sender.

When the Consumer Association contacted Evri about scammers impersonating its brand, it said: 'We're aware of smishing attempts claiming to be Evri, where individuals receive a text message including a link to pay for parcel delivery. We would never ask for payment in this way.'

The possible outcome from providing the information requested is covered in the article below:-

Small steps that could lead to impersonation fraud

If you received a call from someone you'd never spoken to before, telling you to transfer the entire contents of your bank account to them straight away, you probably wouldn't do it. And you'd almost certainly hang up.

But what if you receive a text message about a current event, for example, COVID-19? It warns you that you've been in close contact with someone who has been isolating and includes a link to order a free test kit. What if you click on the link, put in your details to order one and add your card details to pay a small delivery fee?

*In a couple of almost unnoticeable steps, you would have become a victim of fraud. **Criminals would have your card details and personal information to use again or sell.** Other examples could be text messages supposedly from Royal Mail, a parcel delivery company or any trusted organisation, encouraging you to click a link.*

Once they've got your details, fraudsters can take it one step further. For example, sometime later you might receive a call from someone claiming to be your bank:

- 1. They tell you you've been a victim of fraud and you need to move your money out of your account quickly before it's stolen.*
- 2. They seem convincing because they already know some of your information. That's the information you shared when you clicked the link in the text message.*
- 3. You're scared, stressed, and confused about the situation but pressured to act quickly.*
- 4. What if, acting in fear, you transferred your money to new account details? The account wasn't in your name, but the fraudsters, posing as your bank, gave you convincing reasons to do so.*

You would now have become a victim of impersonation fraud.

Fraudsters are clever and manipulative. If anyone claims to be from your bank, HMRC or any trusted organisation, even the police, and calls to tell you to move your money, stop. End the call straight away and call your bank using the number on the back of your card.

Easton's History

The 1919 Estate Sale

The Easton Park Estate Sale by Auction took place on Tuesday 29th April, 1919 at the at the Crown & Anchor Hotel, Ipswich on

Tuesday, April 29th, 1919.

During my research into Easton's History, I have been able to acquire one of the bound Auction Catalogues for this sale. It is complete with photographs of larger properties and full descriptions of every property, with details of the names of tenants, and rent being paid.

Unfortunately, my grandparents died before I was born, but through this Catalogue I was able to discover that my paternal grandparents, after my grandfather retired as a horseman on the estate, lived in the right-hand cottage of Lowbarn Cottages and William Boon paid a rent of £4/10s per annum.



Since moving to Easton in 2007, we knew that my grandparents and father had lived in our village and worked on the estate. The 1911 Census revealed that they and my grandfather, before retirement, lived in the left-hand half of the semi-detached cottages in School Lane next door to where we now live (Plot 64). An amazing coincidence. I have several relatives buried in Easton cemetery.

The attached map sections from the sale in the centre of the village identify Lot numbers from the sale of properties in 1919. I can link those Plot numbers to the descriptions in the Catalogue of the occupying tenants and descriptions of the properties.

If they would be of interest and anyone would like a copy, please let me know. I am very happy to produce copies at a small cost to cover expenses.

DR DAN POULTER MP

Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

The Covid pandemic has disrupted international supply lines for many of the goods and services that we previously took for granted, the consequence being an increase in inflation, which drives up the cost of living. This challenge is now further compounded by war in the Ukraine and whilst our thoughts are quite rightly with the people of Ukraine, we must also recognise the need for the UK to become more self-sufficient in the future, and less reliant on imported goods - particularly food and energy.

Ukraine was the biggest international producer of fertiliser and the biggest exporter of wheat. As a result of the war, there has been considerable disruption to supplies, leading to increases in the cost of many food stuffs in our shops, such as bread and breakfast cereals.

Looking ahead, we simply must produce more of our own food. By protecting and supporting our farmers and food producers, we also protect consumers by keeping food prices in the shops lower in the long run.

Here in Suffolk, our farmers stand ready to rise to the challenge of producing more locally grown food, but we must also look to support them better. We've heard from our farming leaders that they are concerned about "crippling" labour shortages, and I'd like to see the Government look at improving current immigration policies, as well as at the Skilled Workers Visa scheme, to try and help tackle this issue.

We also need to step down our reliance on an overseas workforce to plug our seasonal workforce gap. To achieve this, we need to develop home grown talent – make the sector appealing to work in, develop a greater vocational offer and bring forward and support our next generation of farmers and food producers. Where appropriate, I would also like to see greater support become available, allowing our farmers to diversify and support the appropriate roll-out of solar energy, whilst simultaneously recognising the need to protect our precious farmland from inappropriate housing development.

I am disappointed that Ipswich Borough Council chose to prioritise the development of green fields of the northern fringe, rather than prioritise brownfield development in the town centre. Brownfield town centre redevelopment would also have helped to regenerate a part of the town that most needed it. I have no doubt that the shop keepers in the town centre would also have liked to have the additional footfall that this regeneration would potentially have delivered. Approaches such as these have worked well elsewhere, and it is time that all of our local councils put into action a brownfield first policy. But more than this, we need to start protecting and supporting our own food producers. We need to start listening more to our farmers and, where is practicably reasonable, better protect farming land for food production.

The war in the Ukraine has brought much into perspective - the importance of protecting freedom of speech, the importance of improving our energy security, and the importance of increasing our food security. If we want to keep food prices in the shops down in the long run, perhaps it is time we thought not just in terms of fair-trade shopping, but of supporting local. It is only through supporting our local farmers and food producers that we will help to keep prices down for consumers and hard-pressed families.

After a two-year absence, The Letheringham Priory Spring Concert returned on Friday 29th April. It was a real privilege to listen to Garry Magee sing Ralph Vaughan Williams' Song Cycle, **Songs of Travel**, supplemented with an extended programme of songs by various composers ranging from Gluck to Handel. Garry was accompanied by Christine Whiffen (piano), who additionally played two solo pieces by Grieg and Ingot. The concert raised some £741 for St Mary's restoration fund and will go towards the much needed repairs to the Church Fabric.

Our thanks to Garry and Christine and everyone that helped make this a very special evening.


Monday Mardle June 6th at 7pm : Soil Cinderellas

A **crowd** gathered outside, they were all excited because each of them heard the believers speaking in their **own**


