## June in the Garden

“In June as many as a dozen species may burst their buds on a single day. No man can heed all of these anniversaries; no man can ignore all of them.”

Aldo Leopold

June 21st is the longest day of the year, and the extra light and warmth encourages the garden to put on an exuberant burst of growth. Flowers are blossoming, there's lots to harvest in the vegetable garden, and keeping on top of bolting plants is a priority — particularly the weeds!

### **Jobs for the ornamental garden**

Keep weeding to ensure borders stay looking their best - a sharp hoe will make the job much quicker and almost effortless.

Position summer hanging baskets and containers outside.

Deadhead delphinium and lupin as soon as they finish flowering to increase the chances of a second flush later in the summer

Sow biennials such as wallflower, foxglove, honesty and sweet rocket now for early spring flowers next year.

Strong winds at this time of year can cause quite a bit of damage to taller perennials, so it's essential to keep staking and tying them in to help prevent damage, especially with vulnerable plants such as delphiniums, peonies and chrysanthemums.

Deadhead roses as often as you can now they're flowering at full tilt. Snip off their browning heads to a bud or leaf below. Rambling and climbing roses will be growing rapidly so tie them in regularly as close to the horizontal as possible.

Summer rainfall is rarely enough to keep compost moist in containers, so warm weather means daily watering of pots and hanging baskets. If already dry, rehydrate the compost by plunging the whole thing in water for an hour or so.

## Jobs in the Edible Garden

Continue with successional sowings of radishes, lettuce and salad leaves.

Plant cucumbers, tomatoes and beans out into the garden watering them in well and tie gently into their supports.

Pinch out side-shoots on tomatoes. Removing side-shoots is simple – every time you water, check the plant for any shoots sprouting just above each leaf, from the joint between the leaf and the stem and pinch between thumb and forefinger to remove.

If not already done, cover fruit trees and bushes with netting to help protect from birds.

Thin out the swelling fruit on trees to prevent broken branches and help the remaining fruit grow all the larger.

## DR DAN POULTER MP

As many of our children and grandchildren enter the summer exam term, it provides an opportunity to reflect upon what skills and qualifications are now needed for young people entering the world of work.

The Prime Minister recently announced that in future, all children will need to study maths until age 18. Although compulsory maths until the age of 18 does not, initially, feel very attractive, I believe we can change perceptions of the subject. Applying maths skills in the real world is essential in all jobs and walks of life and offers an increase in self-confidence that will serve our children well throughout their lives.

As a regular visitor to schools across our area, I am proud of the hard work that goes into supporting our children. During a recent visit to Kesgrave High School, I was asked some excellent questions by a student around encouraging young women to take up Science, Tech, Engineering and Maths (STEM) qualifications and retaining that talent for lifelong careers in Suffolk.

It has become clear to me that our young people care deeply about achieving net zero, and I am pleased that along with sixth forms, we have a wide range of educational settings here that offer these qualifications, such as Suffolk New and Suffolk Rural. Our schools and colleges have strong relationships with local businesses and are already seeking opportunities for our young people with Sizewell C.

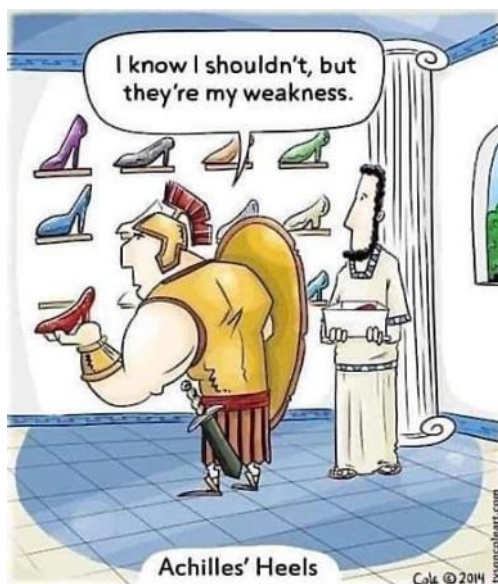
Suffolk's Energy Coast is internationally recognised as excellent in producing and delivering sustainable, clean energy solutions, offering great careers and underpinning economic growth here in Suffolk and across the UK. We have one of the driest climates in England with longer hours of daily sunshine and miles of coastline, so it is seen as the perfect location for solar energy and of course, offshore wind.

I have reservations about the proposals for Sizewell C, but until we can find better ways of storing the electricity produced by renewable sources, nuclear power remains an important form of electricity production.

We are all striving to be more environmentally conscious and nuclear energy has the advantage of being carbon neutral and so reduces reliance on fossil fuels.

Maths underpins achievement in all STEM subjects which are key to supporting the growth in jobs in Suffolk's energy industry. Thanks to Suffolk's leading role in the nuclear and renewables sector, our young people can play their part in building a brighter, greener future, but let's not forget that maths is useful in all walks of life. Young people will one day need to manage household budgets, understand mobile phone contracts and arrange mortgages. These skills are workplace transferable, and we must not fail our children when it comes to confidence in maths both for their own lives and in safeguarding a strong economic future for the country.

I am incredibly proud of everything we have to offer young people, here in Suffolk. I couldn't think of a better place to live and work, and I wish all our students all the very best for their exams and hopefully some outstanding results to come.

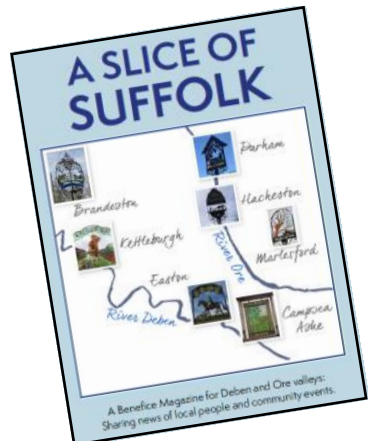

## Neighbourhood Watch

### News for June

#### **Weak banking security is leaving customers vulnerable to fraud on stolen phones**

A happy afternoon spent in a London pub at the beginning of the year quickly turned sour when Nick, a company director from Somerset, realised someone had stolen his phone. He reported it to the police and went home. By morning, the thief had drained £73,000 from his personal and business Barclays accounts.

In just a few hours, the fraudster had logged into Nick's Barclays app, added an account they controlled as a new payee and reset the password on a bulk business payment system provided by a company called Telleroo.

#### **How did they do it?**

The thief had likely 'shoulder-surfed' Nick first to see the code he used to unlock his phone and then tried similar combinations to access the app.

Barclays only requires you to provide debit card details to add a new payee, and these details are stored in the app, meaning that the thief had everything they needed to steal his money.

This case also highlights the problem with financial firms using SMS to deliver security checks. Having realised that Nick's business used Telleroo to send bulk payments, the thief simply reset his account password by triggering a one-time passcode sent to the stolen phone. Similarly, Barclays' system did detect suspicious activity, but sent a fraud warning via SMS, straight into the hands of the criminal, who authorised the payments while he slept.

#### **How criminals can bypass bank app security**

The most obvious vulnerability point is re-setting your app login details.

Some banks ask you to re-register for the app or pass strict identity checks to do this (Chase and Monzo both ask for photo ID and a 'selfie' video, for example), while others only ask for basic information that's more easily obtained by a thief.

In our test, we could too easily reset the passwords of various Lloyds Banking Group apps. The Halifax and MBNA apps only required credit card details and a one-time passcode sent via SMS to the same phone. For Lloyds, we had to enter a four-digit code generated on the phone during an automated call.

Amex users can also choose the 'forgot password' option, enter their credit card details and receive a one-time passcode sent via text or email, both of which a thief could access directly from a stolen phone.

## **The problem with SMS**

SMS is widely considered to be an insecure method of sending highly sensitive information. A thief can see messages (including security codes sent by your bank) flash up on the screen even when a stolen phone is locked – or they could put your stolen Sim in another phone to receive messages. Both features can be disabled.

Other banks using SMS-based security will ask for additional details to recover app login details, such as your online banking password, which could be enough to thwart a thief. But this is largely pointless if that password can also be re-set with the same security check. This is the case with Virgin Money, which asks for a one-time passcode to re-set both the app passcode and the online banking password (which itself is used to re-set the app passcode).

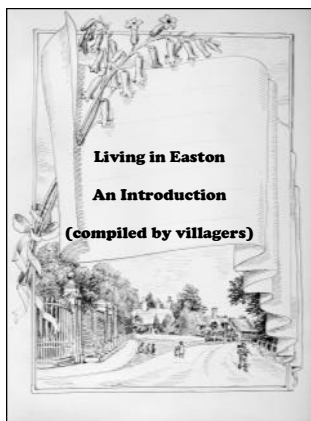
## **3 ways to protect your phone**

Here are three simple steps you can take:

- **Add a unique Pin to your Sim:** By securing your Sim with a Pin, you could stop someone stealing yours to put into another phone. If a thief can't break into a locked phone, they can pop the Sim in a different phone to receive calls and messages. That wouldn't give them direct access to your banking apps, but it could allow them to pass security checks to activate these apps on a new phone.
- **Disable preview notifications:** Messages can flash up on your phone screen even when your phone is locked, meaning a thief could view text messages or emails sent by your bank. On an iPhone, you can change notification settings under 'messages.' On Android devices, it's 'notifications on lock screen' in your Settings app.
- **Register for phone-finding services:** Use Google's Find My Device or Apple's Find My iPhone, so your phone can be located, locked or wiped of data remotely if it's lost or stolen.

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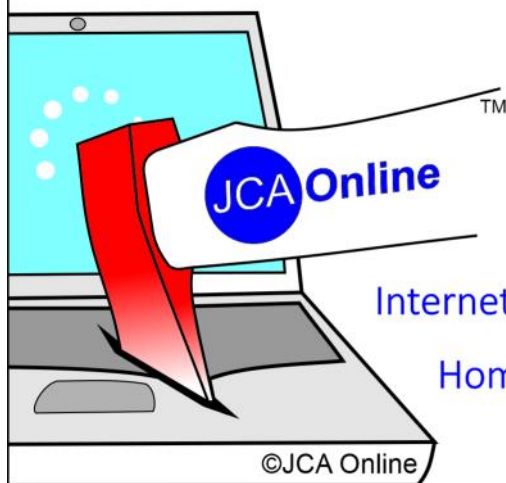
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
