## **From The Reverend Canon Deirdre Parmenter**

Over the last few months it has been a pleasure and a privilege to conduct services during the vacancy in the seven churches in the benefice. As retired priests we are not strictly part of the team, but with the bishop's diocesan license most of us offer our help and support when invited.

Throughout life we all experience beginnings and endings of one sort or another, some difficult and some exciting. However, most beginnings or endings are a challenge when the rhythm of life is thrown off balance and adjustments have to be made. People retire, move house, experience the joy of a new birth, the concern of illness, or the sadness of grief.

Mary and Joseph experienced the role of the asylum seekers as they fled Bethlehem for Egypt in order to protect their new born son. On their return, Jesus grew up in the safety of Nazareth before, at the age of about 30, beginning his challenging public ministry leading to the pain and tribulation of persecution, ultimately dying for his faith and love of us.

We cannot know what the coming months hold for us, but we can learn to trust in Christ, the Light of the World. We can be reassured that whatever changes or challenges lie ahead, the love of God is always near and always constant. We give thanks and pray for our new priest Graham to be licensed in May, and also for his wife Sue and the family. We ask God to help Graham and us to come together to share worship and community life as our seven parishes in the Orebeck Benefice plan ahead to witness God and his love.

Whatever the coming months bring, I pray that the Light of Christ will light your path and keep you safe during Lent and into Easter and beyond.

## **The Seven Last Words of our Saviour from the Cross**

Good Friday 11.30am at Hacheston Church  
(see previous page)

Haydn was commissioned in 1785 by the Canon of Cadiz Cathedral to write seven slow movements describing each of the last words from the cross.

After the prelude comes the sentence 'Father forgive them for they know not what they do', followed by a brief meditation and prayer. This leads to a slow movement from the string quartet describing those words. This pattern is then repeated until the seventh reading – 'Into Thy hands, Lord, I commend my spirit' and the slow movement after which Haydn completes the work with a finale of loud and fast music depicting the earthquake and the rending of the temple curtain.

The whole thing will take 90 minutes. The liturgical side of the proceedings will be led by Richard Ginn and Deirdre Parmenter.

We are extremely lucky to have Jim Macleod leading the Sudbourne Ensemble to provide the music. Do come and don't miss a truly memorable event.

# Easton Neighbourhood Plan

## Have you filled in your Questionnaire?

All adult residents should have received their Questionnaires.

Please spare some time to fill in your Questionnaire, it will help the Parish develop in the way that those who live in it, wish it to, rather than leaving it to developers and planners who don't.

The Questionnaire lets everyone give their views and these are needed to produce the policies that form the Neighbourhood Plan. A balanced response result is important - this can only happen if everyone takes part. There is an Invite for the Neighbourhood Plan Summer Event, the RSVP is part of the Questionnaire.

The Summer Event will have a Prosecco and Canapes theme. The results of the Questionnaire and progress of the Plan will be displayed. There will be an interactive display illustrating the History of Easton and the Hamilton family.

There will also be an Archaeological Exhibition. SCC Archaeological Services will man a display table with the most important Archaeological finds along with a record of all finds found during the survey prior to the Hopkins Homes estate being built; there will be a short film showing the dig followed by question time.

## Local places of interest

### A spare afternoon 1) Potsford Gibbet, Dragarse Hill & Letheringham Mill

The story behind this title dates back to the 1690s and concerns a Jonah Snell, who was sentenced to be hung for two gruesome murders which took place at Letheringham Mill in 1698.

Jonah was a Journeyman, namely a competent man hiring himself out on a daily wage. He was being employed by a John Bullard and the story recounts that he and his son were doing the accounts in Letheringham Mill when Jonah walked in with an axe and killed them both. He then hung them upside down from a beam inside the mill. Jonah was found nearby, still in possession of the axe.

Despite protesting his innocence, he was tried, found guilty and subsequently executed at Wickham Market. His body was then hung in a cage from Potsford Gibbet on 14<sup>th</sup> April 1699 as a warning to others, and his bones were later buried nearby, apparently in 1740. (*Note: Gallows were used for hangings, but gibbets for displaying bodies until they decayed.*)





### ***The Plaque Reads***

*Remains of Potsford Gibbet  
In use at the end of 17<sup>th</sup> century*

*Last known Hanging April 14<sup>th</sup> 1699*

*(Jonah Snell)*

According to the story, he was dragged on his back from Wickham Market up the hill to the gibbet. The route was along what is now the B1078. The hill became known locally as Dragarse Hill and is still called that on a local tourist map.

Location and directions; O.S. Map Ref = TM 287564

By **car**: - Location is off the B1078, Wickham to Charsfield Road, on the left-hand side when travelling towards Charsfield. Footpath is signed beside a wood, about 400 metres on the left past the lane to Valley Farm. Or over Glevering Bridge, turn immediately right and follow lane to B1078, then turn right. Gate and footpath sign is 400 metres on the left. Follow footpath for about 200 metres. Care needed when parking.

Those fancying a **walk**: - Starting at Letheringham Mill, follow the road towards Letheringham to the right-hand bend immediately before Brickles Cottages. Turn left on the bend towards the south west until reaching the B1078. Turn left and about 400 metres on your right you will see the gate and footpath sign. Care needed as no footpath on B1078. Remains of gibbet are on the right about 200 metres.

**Take care**: This site has gained notoriety for hauntings, both day and night. More information can be obtained by entering 'Dragarse Hill' in your web browser.

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**



## **Fake Amazon emails claim you have placed an order**

**Action Fraud has received several reports from victims who have been sent convincing looking emails claiming to be from Amazon.**

The spoofed emails from “**service@amazon.co.uk**” claim recipients have made an order online and mimic an automatic customer email notification.

The emails cleverly state that if recipients haven’t authorised the transaction they can click on the help centre link to receive a full refund.

The link leads to an authentic-looking website, which asks victims to confirm their name, address, and bank card information.

### **Amazon says that suspicious emails will often contain:**

- Links to websites that look like Amazon.co.uk, but aren't Amazon.co.uk.
- Attachments or prompts to install malicious software on your computer.
- Typos or grammatical errors.
- Forged (or spoofed) e-mail addresses to make it look like the email is coming from Amazon.co.uk.

### **In addition**

Amazon will never ask for personal information to be supplied by email.

Suspicious emails can be reported to Amazon by sending it to [stop-spoofing@amazon.com](mailto:stop-spoofing@amazon.com).

The Hearing Care Centre has given the surgery a large tower of chocolates, sweets and biscuits and we will shortly be raffling this off in aid of the charity.

### **Proposed Extension to Surgery**

Having had confirmation of the Community Infrastructure Levy we are tentatively moving forward with plans to extend the surgery. Over the next few weeks builders will be at the surgery preparing quotes for the work and once completed these will be re-submitted to NHS England for further consideration and, hopefully, final confirmation of a grant.

### **DNA [Did Not Attend] Appointments**

It would be very helpful if patients could inform reception if they are unable to attend an appointment. In the last quarter (1<sup>st</sup> October – 31<sup>st</sup> December 2017) there were 284 missed appointments which equates to over 47 hours of wasted clinical time.

### **Patient Survey**

Our annual patient survey took place in October/November last year. We are very pleased that 90% of all patient ratings about the practice were good, very good or excellent. A detailed copy of the report is available on our website.

### **Employee of the Year**

Over the past year the GP Partners have been selecting an Employee of the Month and from this list of successful nominations, an Employee of the Year has been chosen. Shelby Jessop who works in both the Administration and Reception Teams is the deserving winner. Shelby started at the Practice 16 months ago as an Apprentice and is now on a full term contract with us.

## Travelling abroad with Medication

We all have heard in the news of people being imprisoned for carrying illegal medication into a country and we have the following advice for our patients travelling with medication:

- It is the patient's responsibility to establish the rules for their destination, airline and any country they are travelling through. These may all be different!
- You need to remember prescribed AND over-the-counter medications. (*In some areas, common over-the-counter medications such as nasal decongestant inhalers (VICKS to you and I) and cough linctus are banned.*)
- Even travelling within Europe may require some care if you are using controlled drugs:
- Government advice is that a patient must be able to prove controlled medication belongs to them to travel into or out of the UK.
  - This requires a letter outlining use and countersigned by 'the person who prescribed the drugs'.
  - If carrying more than 3 months' supply, they will also need a Home Office licence:

*We advise you to contact the Embassy to ensure your medication is permitted.*

In some cases you may require a letter for travel and as this is not a NHS service there will be a charge.

## Can you help us?




