Easton Neighbourhood Plan



Thank you to everyone who came along to the Neighbourhood Plan drop in event on Saturday 4th February. It was lovely seeing so many people. Thank you too, to those who are using the online option for responses. The consultation period lasts until March 20th.

The Neighbourhood Plan is a Planning Policy for Easton, which if voted for, East Suffolk Council will use when deciding on planning applications. It's a policy which, whilst it has to accept the housing numbers from East Suffolk Council, is able to state where they should be sited and how they should look

The months ahead will be filled with all the formalities required by the process, Easton's Draft NP will take on relevant changes and modifications resulting from the consideration of responses from the public consultation that is taking place, then an authority's consultation, external examination, referendum, and if the majority vote is of support, East Suffolk Council adopt the Easton Neighbourhood Plan.

It's expected that the referendum vote for those that live in Easton will be later this year.

There is a copy of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan and the supporting documents with response forms in the church porch, the Parish Council website https://easton.suffolk.cloud/neighbourhood-plan/ neighbourhood plan page has all the documents and online response forms. The online response forms go directly to our NP planning consultant, who inputs all the responses from online and hard copy and sends on to East Suffolk Council.

Parish Council Elections – 4th May 2023



Parish Councillors hold their seats for four years, nominations are put forward each election year by those who wish to hold an elected seat on the Parish Council for the next four year period.

For anyone wishing to stand for election and become a Parish Councillor, all details can be found on the East Suffolk website. The publication of notice of election will be on Thursday March 16th and nomination papers can be submitted up to 4pm Tuesday April 4th

I have recently taken over as Chairman of the cricket club and so wanted to introduce myself and our Junior Chairman and Easton resident, Angus Pearson, to share our vision for the future.

In my opinion, and one of the reasons I was so keen to take on the Chairman's role, is that I genuinely believe Easton Cricket Club is uniquely positioned to become one of the premier cricket clubs in the region over the course of the next five years.

With one of the most picturesque grounds around, a large catchment area at both junior and senior levels, a 1st XI recently promoted to Division 1 of the Two Counties Cricket Championship, there is an extremely solid base and vibrant energy about the club to harness and build upon.

I see no reason why Easton CC cannot be competing for Cup and Division Titles across all age-groups, and for the seniors knocking on the door of Lord's in the Village Cup Final in the years to come!

Unknown to many, Easton has a rich history with Sir Pelham Warner (Captain of England in 1903-04 and MCC President), Bernard Bosanquet (Middlesex and inventor of the googly) both having represented the club in its formative years. Celebrating this history and the colourful legacy of past players and characters is important and I would like to make this more visible in the clubhouse.

The 1st XI is undoubtedly important to the success and profile of the club but I am also proud of our Ladies Team and we have a thriving Junior section that continues to go from strength to strength. Whether our young players have aspirations of professional cricket, representative county cricket or just want to enjoy the game with their school friends, we are keen for players of all abilities to feel welcome and have a home at Easton.

Building on the recent rise in popularity of the women's game we also see an opportunity to increase the number of girls playing cricket at the club and so this will be a priority moving forward, ensuring a pipeline of talent for our Ladies Team.

Last but not least, I would like to build a club that is as sustainable and successful off the field as on it and will be seeking support to ensure we set a high standard for energy efficiency in the clubhouse and surrounding grounds.

Mike 'The Moth Man'

In a new feature, we explore unusual or interesting hobbies enjoyed by our neighbours. To start the ball rolling, I talked to Mike Prentice about his love of trapping and identifying moths.

What made you take up studying moths?

After many knee operations, I had to give up playing golf, so early in 2018 I took up being an amateur lepidopterist.

Where and how do you capture the moths?

I trap in my own garden and also, with the kind permission of Martley Hall, on the edge of the wooded area to the rear of where I live. I have special light traps which I put out at dusk. Since I began, I have caught over 150,000 moths.



Is this a seasonal hobby?

Moths can be found at all times of the year—different species in different months. The most prolific months however are June, July and August.

Once you've collected the moths, what happens next?

I bring them into our summer house, often at dawn, where I identify and photograph them if necessary, and then release them - away from where they were caught which reduces the chance of re-capture.

What do you do with the information?

In 2019 I became a member of the Suffolk Moth Group who currently have 238 members! Since then all moths caught have been recorded online and are part of the Suffolk data base, this data eventually becoming part of the national records.

There are over 1800 different species of moth that occur naturally in the UK. Some of these species have never been recorded in Suffolk. Currently I have identified and recorded 858 different species.

Tell us a bit more about moths.

There are two classifications of moth—macro and micro, ie large and small, the smallest can be only 3 mm in length. The life cycle of a moth is relatively short, living long enough to breed. Some even hibernate. Some moths can travel many miles in a night. Beetles, wasps, hornets, bats and of course birds all predate moths.

Any highlights in your collecting experience?

In 2021 I recorded a micro moth that was last recorded in Suffolk in 1933. In 2022 the southerly autumn winds brought in Crimson Speckled moths (pictured) from Europe.



Any moths which occur in Easton that we can keep a look out for?

Hawk Moths, Underwings and Tiger Moths (see over)...

Do your grandchildren get involved?

My granddaughter Freya (pictured below) is very interested and she now has her own traps. Her powers of identification are excellent. Between us we set up two traps at her primary school one evening so that the pupils could see what was flying around the school and playing field at night.

2023-01-30 Ukraine Reflection

As I write these words on a crisp January day, with the festivities seeming far behind, I'm aware the first anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine approaches, by the time you read these lines this sombre date will have just passed. Like many of you I have been reflecting on the impact this has had across our country and particularly here in Suffolk.

The tragic loss of life in Ukraine is deeply saddening and many people have been forced to flee their homes. The UK response to the crisis has been commendable, not least of all here in Suffolk where, as ever, I've been heartened by the response of our local communities.

I've seen first-hand, the compassion for Ukrainian refugees from residents across Suffolk and it is humbling to witness the way the Ukrainian families have settled into life here, with children attending schools and parents finding work. How difficult attempting a normal life in a foreign country must be, whilst worrying about loved ones forced to stay behind.

As a regular visitor to our local schools, during a recent visit I was delighted to meet with a young Ukrainian student who my parliamentary team and I assisted in settling here. The student is now thriving within the school, and I was impressed to learn how easily they had settled into school and Suffolk life, supported by staff and fellow pupils.

Perhaps the biggest impact the conflict has had for many in the UK and around the world is on the cost of living. We still find ourselves in the midst of a challenging winter as we count the cost of Putin's energy war. However, despite this, we welcome the news that in recent weeks, gas prices have thankfully stabilised and started to fall. This will help in reducing the impact of the war on the UK's inflation and cost of living for everyone.

In addition to the impact on energy supplies and prices, Putin also appears to be weaponising food supplies. Both Russia and Ukraine are among the biggest exporters of fertiliser and a further consequence of the conflict has been a reduction in supplies of fertiliser to the UK. This has increased the cost of growing food and resulting in increased prices in the shops.

We all remain concerned about what the future holds for Ukraine and hope for a resolution soon, in the meantime our continued support for the UK Government's position in standing shoulder to shoulder with Ukraine is right. I shall do everything I can to ensure the needs of Suffolk's residents and businesses are heard in Westminster during these challenging times.

They soon settled into Yolk Hall. They love their perch and use wine barrels for nesting boxes. We had eggs from Day One.

I was concerned about introducing them to the dogs. Bear is a Husky/Sharpei cross and Emrys a Saluki - hardly bird friendly. I needn't have worried. Bear now identifies as a chicken and Emrys has decided they are not for her and gives them a wide berth.

I love having the chucks, yes they are messy and I don't think the garden will ever be the same but the joy they bring as they get up to their adventures and the fact that, outside of bird lockdown, everywhere you go in the garden you have a friend, takes me back to those happy childhood memories.

I know there are many people in the village who have chickens too. I love connecting with them and when they share their stories it is clear that the chicks are bringing them as much joy as my Fab Four do for me. If you are thinking about adopting chickens, the British Hen Welfare trust are excellent. You can find them on line, just search BHWT and it will take you to their site.


Social Bridge Evenings

It's that time of year!

(Advice from John Owen)

As we approach the end of the tax year the scammers are at it once again, pretending to be from HMRC. Below is a brief summary from The Consumer Association of how they are trying to steal our money.

Letters

Scammers have been sending letters saying you are in debt and owe money to HMRC, using the typical scam tactic of scaring you into action.

These letters also use HMRC's recognisable logo and reference the official government website, but include a scam phone number - and they're banking on you calling it.

Once they have you on the phone, you're likely to be asked for your bank details and duped into making a payment to them.

Phone Calls

HMRC has warned of scam calls doing the rounds, including one that features an automated message telling you that HMRC is taking you to court and instructing you to 'press 1' to speak to a caseworker. If you stay on to speak to someone, scammers on the other end of the call will most likely eventually ask for your bank information.

Email

These emails use HMRC branding to appear genuine - fraudsters can also spoof email addresses, making it difficult to tell if it's a scam. They'll usually include links to phoney websites where scammers will be aiming to get your personal and financial information.

QR Codes

Watch out for scam QR codes. While the tax office does use QR codes to help you complete payments on your mobile - this will appear when you log into your personal tax account on a computer - if you receive a QR code supposedly from HMRC via text or email, it's a scam

Microsoft impersonation scam

Scammers are impersonating Microsoft in dodgy emails telling recipients they must update their Hotmail password. If you click the link in the email, you'll ultimately be asked to enter your email address and password on a website that uses fake Hotmail branding. And if you enter your details, you'll be giving scammers access to your emails.

PayPal 'money request' email scam

Scammers are exploiting PayPal's 'request money' feature to scare customers into calling dodgy phone numbers and giving away their personal data.

This scam involves fraudsters sending fake emails requesting payments for high-value items, or posing as HMRC to demand 'overdue' tax payments. If you call the number in the email, you'll be ringing a scammer phishing for your personal information.

WhatsApp

With WhatsApp protecting your personal messages with end-to-end encryption, it is becoming more and more popular as a means of communication. It is also becoming more and more popular with fraudsters.

Advice from the Consumer Association:

"If you receive an unexpected WhatsApp message, treat it with caution. Never click on any links in unsolicited WhatsApp messages. You can report the message by selecting it in your conversation list and tapping 'report'. To report the sender on WhatsApp, open up the chat, tap on the sender's contact details and select 'Block and Report'."

- Keep halls and stairs well lit


- If you are taking a lot of medication check you are taking correctly



Harbingers of Spring



The Rookery by the bridge by the kennels - strictly speaking just in Letheringham as over the river.

It has been there at least thirty years and is very much a harbinger of spring with the dulcet cawing of the rooks and clattering nest building signalling lengthening if not always warmer days.



Snowdrops - Galanthus nivalis - are a welcome sign that the days are lengthening and that winter is passing into spring.

Thought to have been introduced in Tudor times, snowdrops are now widely naturalised in parks, woodlands and gardens. The presence of stable and long established parks and gardens,






