# NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



## Personal Safety (Part 1)

Whilst it is true to say that, relatively speaking, we live in a safe part of the country, certain types of crime are on the increase. Here is some valuable advice from the Met Police, whether you are close to home or travelling.

### How to protect yourself from street robbery

Here are some useful ways to keep you and your property safe on the street.

#### **Know where you're going**

Plan your route and think about what to take with you, especially if you're going somewhere you haven't been before. Keep to busy, well-lit streets, walkways and paths which are more likely to be covered by CCTV. Only take licensed taxis or minicabs booked by phone or a mobile phone app.

#### **Look confident**

You are less likely to be targeted if you look confident. Move with purpose and try to be aware of your surroundings.

#### **Hide it**

Keep your mobile phone and valuables out of sight. If you're using your phone it's more likely to be snatched from your hand as you're not paying attention to your surroundings, so look around you.

Never leave a mobile or any other device, wallet or purse on the table of an outdoor café, pub or restaurant. Same goes for any jewellery you might be wearing – keep it covered when walking down the street.

Finally – and this is so important to remember – if you're threatened with violence, don't risk your personal safety. Property can be replaced, you can't.

### Don't let them pocket it

You may have an idea of what a pickpocket looks like but they're far less likely to stand out in a crowd than you might think since blending in is part of how they avoid being caught. Here's how to spot a potential pickpocket and avoid losing your belongings to one.

#### **How to spot a pickpocket**

##### **The observers**

These include people loitering in public places who appear to be checking out passers-by, paying particular interest to their handbags, shopping bags and where they might place their wallet or purse.

For example, be aware of individuals who appear to be focusing their attention on the waist area of others. This may be an indication of criminal intent and probable theft. But do bear in mind the fact that some people are naturally shy and do avoid eye contact. Always follow your instincts.

##### **The opportunists**

Pickpockets also operate in shops and department stores, where people are more likely to be standing still, distracted and so paying less attention to their belongings, making them an easier target.

Be more aware of your surroundings in busy shops and shopping centres because they're ideal places for pickpockets, as it's easier for them to brush past people, take items and blend into the crowd.

## **Team tactics**

Pickpockets don't always operate alone, they may work in teams to distract the target while someone unseen removes the items and blends back into the crowd. Another member might step in as an enforcer in the event of an altercation.

## **Crowding in**

Thieves vary their tactics based on the location and the density of the crowd. One tactic is where a group of them push up against a victim in a crowded shop or street then quickly reach into the victim's pocket and steal their wallet, phone or purse.

## **Dirty tricks**

Remember, pickpockets are very skilled at what they do. They know all the tricks and are extremely light-fingered with most of their thefts only taking a second or two. One of their tactics is 'hugger mugging' where a thief will appear to be over-friendly for no particular reason and hug you while pickpocketing you.

## **The point of distraction**

Pickpocket teams are adept at creating distractions. This could be anything from a game to a loud shout, all designed to avert your attention while an unseen accomplice steals your valuables. So do try not to be easily distracted.

## **Are you a prime target?**

### **Do's**

- Do keep purses and bags closed and secure at all times.
- Do carry bags in front of you or diagonally across your chest.
- Do return cards to your purse or wallet quickly and zip it up or button it.
- Do use a purse that's difficult to open. One that zips or snaps shut is best, and keep it closed.
- Do use a money belt if you're carrying a significant quantity of cash.
- Do conceal your wallet in a buttoned or zipped pocket where it doesn't bulge.
- Do keep a list, separate from your wallet and phone, of contact numbers of family in case your phone is stolen.
- Do keep a photocopy of your airline tickets, passport, credit cards and any other documents that would be impossible or inconvenient to replace if stolen.

### **Don'ts**

- Don't hang stuff on the back of a chair.
- Don't leave anything on the back of a pushchair.
- Don't place your belongings out of sight on the floor. Remember, having a zipped bag doesn't mean you're totally safe. Thieves have been known to walk behind victims while slowly unzipping bags. Yes, they can be that bold. So, never underestimate a pickpocket.

# Village People

## Ian Palfreyman



### **How long have you lived in Easton?**

Jenny, Myles and I will have lived in the village for thirteen years this August. The time has flown by, Myles was just about to turn four when we moved in and now he is doing his A levels! Although compared to some we are still newbies.

### **Why did you move here?**

Jenny and I had spent most of our lives living in towns and cities. When Myles was born, we thought long and hard about the environment we wanted to live in as a family and the school that would work best for him. We decided that living in the countryside with access to walks would be ideal. The thought of living in a community with neighbours you get to know and trust was important to us. Having done a lot of research and thinking we decided on what was the right school and then looked at locations within a fifteen minute drive and stumbled across Easton...

### **What's your favourite thing about living here?**

Two things come to mind. I like the quiet and calm of the village, I personally find it very relaxing, especially after spending a lot of the week travelling. I love the natural world so enjoy the lack of light pollution as some of the night skies are stunning. The fact we have a variety of nature and wildlife visit the garden is lovely too.

### **What's your *least* favourite thing about living here?**

My least favourite thing doesn't affect me at all, it is more of an uncomfortableness. It's the fact that one family own a large amount of the land, properties and businesses in the village and have the resources to continue to purchase more as they come on the market. Although I have no personal concerns about this fact or any issue with members of the family, it's just that amount of potential power and influence over a relatively small community sits uncomfortably with me, and it would wherever I lived.

### **What's the most interesting job you've ever had?**

My working life has been a game of two halves. I spend the first sixteen years on corporate life in the energy and finance sector. For the last twenty years I have been working for myself running a business in Leadership and Organisational Development. In terms of interesting assignments, I spent time working with international crews on board cable laying ships in the Philippines and off the coast of South America working on cross-cultural leadership programmes.

### **Have you ever lived in another country?**

I have been very fortunate to have done a lot of travelling independently, as a family and with work, and have spent time on every continent except Antarctica. The only time I could say I have 'lived' abroad was in 1988 when I was involved in a community and conservation project in East Africa and spent four months living with the tribes of Kenya in the Aberdare and Arusha National Parks installing water pumping projects and building medical centres. Last week we had very special day celebrating Jenny's birthday as a family watching a perfect sunset over the Itsukushima Shrine in the sea at Miyajima in Southern Japan.

**If you could pass any law you would ...**

Controversially I have sympathy for introducing the law to legalise all recreational drugs but not because I believe in drug taking. On the contrary, I think they are bad for you. But so are cigarettes and excessive alcohol and they are both addictive drugs. The war on drugs can't be won with policing and education, too much global organised crime revolves around the trade. So if they were legalised, manufactured safely in a regulated way, sold at an affordable price and taxed, you would undermine the biggest criminal networks in the world. With resulting tax revenues you could treat addicts as we do alcoholics and smokers with respect and sympathy, not as criminals.

**Your greatest strength is ...**

I have a strong moral compass about what is right and wrong and fair and unfair. I am not afraid to 'call it out' if I feel someone isn't behaving appropriately, or the impact of their behaviour is having a detrimental impact on people around them. Professionally this is valued, however in other settings it can get me into a bit of hot water sometimes.

**Your greatest weakness is ...**

From those that know me well, live with me and may have worked with me during my time on the Village Hall Committee, I leave things till the last minute. I tend to put off doing things and making decisions right up until the last possible moment.

**Your favourite TV programme is ...**

I enjoy television as escapism and enjoy a good drama. Recent examples - Line of Duty, Baptiste, Bodyguard etc. I also like all nature-based programmes eg Blue Planet, Springwatch etc. There isn't a single programme I *have* to watch. However, guilty pleasures include Gardeners' World, Antiques Roadshow and Coronation Street.

**Your favourite book ever is ...**

I don't have a single favourite book. In my twenties I would have said Catcher in the Rye by J D Salinger as it had a strong connection with how I was feeling at the time. In more recent years the three novels by Afghan author Khaled Hosseini - The Kite Runner, A Thousand Splendid Suns, And the Mountains Echoed—are stunning novels beautifully written that tell three different yet similar stories. Predominantly they are about love, family, loss and hope in a setting and culture that is different from our own but highlight the common core emotions of humanity across cultures.

**Your favourite place in the UK (other than Easton!) is ...**

I like a hill and a mountain, so the Lake District and Peak District are places I enjoy visiting immensely. Specifically, the Hope and Edale Valleys in Derbyshire. The scenery is stunning and the walks are some of my favourite in the country. Especially up on Kinder Scout or Burbage and Frogget Edges where you can spend all day walking to your heart's content.

**The best day of your life was ...**

If I was being philosophical, I would like to think I haven't had it yet. It would be somewhat disappointing to think the best day has already gone. If I was to think about best days so far then the obvious answer would be my wedding day, and the day Myles was born, if a little stressful!



