From Revd Graham Hedger



The Royal British Legion Poppy appeal uses the strap line 'lest we forget'. No doubt in the coming days many of us will purchase a poppy to support the appeal. Over the years, both as a parish priest and as a RBL chaplain, I have heard stories from former service personnel caught up in conflict and how the sights and sounds have haunted them in civilian life. It is to our shame as a society that so many of those who are rough sleepers are former service personnel who have slipped through the caring net. They, along with many, may well ask was the sacrifice worth it?

As a child I remember the air raid sirens being tested on a regular basis, and even in the seventies I remember the mothballed civil defence HQ in the grounds of our school. The world has always been a place of political tension, and the level of that tension ebbs and flows over the decades. It seems that in our generation there is a slide into tribalism and distrust of people and institutions that increase that sense of fear and foreboding.

Several centuries before the coming of Jesus the Hebrew prophets looked forward to an age when swords would be beaten into ploughs. It is a wonderful picture that requires a new humanity, one driven by values of love, peace and reconciliation - something that we pray for regularly when we pray, 'your kingdom come on earth as in heaven'. At the conclusion of the Service of Remembrance that we use in our churches there is a commitment to peace and reconciliation. For me it is the element of hope that things can improve with men and women of good will. I hope that many will gather in their villages this Remembrance Sunday to remember the sacrifice of many and to make that commitment to work towards a better world today.

Archdeacon Ian Morgan

It was with great sadness that we learned of the recent death of The Venerable Ian Morgan, Archdeacon of Suffolk, on Thursday 3 October after a long period of ill health. He was a friend to many people, both clergy and laity, and he and his wife had in recent years made their home in Marlesford.

Ian had been Archdeacon of Suffolk since 2012, prior to which he had spent many years in parish ministry in Ipswich and a spell at BBC Radio Suffolk. He was ordained at the age of 26 and also had a career as a producer in network broadcasting and a presenter on local radio. For a while he presented the Drive Time programme on Radio Suffolk.

Bishop Martin, said:

"We have lost a dear colleague and friend. Ian served this diocese in a variety of roles over many years and we have all valued his experience, knowledge, wisdom and wit. Throughout his illness his cheerfulness and compassion were never far away, manifestations of the faith that had borne him throughout his life."

The role of an archdeacon is not easily understood, even by those of us in the church! Archdeacon Ian's role was to support the clergy and lay leaders in the Church of England parishes and benefices in east Suffolk. He led services and preached throughout the archdeaconry. Previously he had been Vicar of All Hallows and Team Rector of the South West Ipswich Team Ministry. He was Rural Dean of Ipswich from 2008 to 2012.

The county of Suffolk held a special place in his heart, and he was always delighted by the life and vitality of our villages and communities, with churches at the heart of so many of them.

Archdeacon Ian was married to Tracey and was a much loved husband, father, grandfather, priest, colleague and friend. He will be dearly missed by all those who had the privilege of knowing him.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Last month I reported an Easton resident receiving a phone call relating to Amazon Prime membership. Action Fraud have issued the following warning :

Amazon Prime scam costs victims £400,000 in two months

Unsuspecting Amazon Prime customers are being tricked into handing over their details.

A new scam has seen victims lose more than £400,000 in two months, according to Action Fraud. It said it received 500 reports from people who had been targeted by conmen over the phone.

Customers are initially sent an automated call that tells them someone has signed up to Amazon Prime using their details. They are told to press 1 to cancel the service and are then redirected to a real fraudster who pretends to be part of Amazon customer services. The scammer tells them a subscription was bought in their name and they need to download the Team Viewer app and fill in their bank details so they can stop a similar attack in the future. What the customer doesn't know is the app allows the fraudster to access their computer and see their details, including bank information. Victims are also sometimes told their information is needed so they can be given a refund following a fraudulent purchase on their account.

An Amazon spokesperson said: 'We take phishing and spoofing attempts on our customers seriously, and will never call a customer for payment outside of our website'.

With winter approaching some tips from the insurance industry:

1. Prepare your outside space

Securing your outside space is obviously important in the run up to winter. Make sure your rubbish and recycling bins are stored somewhere secure. This should stop them moving about in high winds, potentially causing damage to a neighbour's property or vehicle.

Also, before the worst of the cold weather sets in, it's a good idea to make sure your gutters are clear of any debris.

2. Secure your shed

Sheds can take a battering during the winter, so make sure doors are shut and locked. Before you do this, you might want to make sure any garden furniture is stored away too.

3. Keep your car somewhere safe

If a storm is forecast, it's a good idea to ensure your car is parked in a safe space. A garage is ideal, which should be locked adequately both as a precaution against thieves, and to stop doors from inadvertently swinging open in any bad weather. If it isn't possible to keep your car in a garage, then try and make sure the vehicle is parked somewhere where it won't be exposed to falling branches, or other types of debris.

4. Keep your house cosy

Before the mercury dips it can pay to check your house is going to be well protected against the cold. Making sure your loft is properly insulated can make a big difference in improving your home's energy efficiency. This will not only help keep your home nice and toasty, but it should help to reduce your heating bills too.

Making sure your pipes don't freeze over is another important task. In the worst cases blockages can lead to burst pipes. To help prevent this, wrap any cold pipes with thermal insulation. Pipes that are particularly vulnerable to freezing include those that either run outside, like through your garage, or through cold areas of your home.

5. Know where your stop cock is

In addition to wrapping your pipes up, it's important to know where your stop cock is – this is the valve that turns off and on the cold water system in your home. If the water in your pipes does freeze, then pressure can build up behind the blocked area, which can cause the pipe to burst. In the unfortunate event this does happen, it's vital you know where your stop cock is so you can shut off the water mains and prevent any flooding.

6. Bleed radiators

You'll know if a radiator needs bleeding because when your heating is on the radiator will be cold at the top and hot at the bottom.

Before you do this you should have a cloth and bleed key at the ready. And ensure your heating has been turned off.

At the top of your radiator locate the valve and turn it anti-clockwise until you hear a hissing sound. Once the water begins to flow, just tighten the valve once more and you're finished. All the while make sure you have the cloth to hand to catch any water that drips from the valve.

7. Keep your heating on a timer

During the colder months it's a good idea to keep your heating ticking over, even if you go away. Ideally you should heat your home for at least one hour every day.

8. Prepare for a power cut

Thankfully power cuts are relatively rare nowadays. However, in the winter it still pays to be prepared, especially if a particularly bad spell of weather is forecast. There are a few essentials that should form part of your emergency kit.

These include a wind-up torch and a battery-powered radio: the latter being good for both entertainment and keeping in touch with the latest weather news.

Back to school! The children are back from their summer break and have already settled in well to the new term. We welcomed 11 new reception children in Caterpillar Class. They have made new friends and are having a great time. We welcome a new member of staff, Mrs Crosbie, who is one of the class teachers and will join Miss Rivera for Serpent Class. I am back from my sick leave and feel like I've never been away! I would like to thank the parents and staff and members of the community for sending kind thoughts throughout my treatment.

At Easton our children are put into four house teams: Jade, Lightning, Crimson and Amethyst. They earn team points for a variety of reasons and aim to win the trophy and a reward at the end of term. The children enjoy finding out on a Friday morning who is in the lead. Each team is led by a year 6 pupil who encourages the younger children to earn team points and praises their team whenever possible.



CITIZENS ADVICE NEEDS YOU!



“You never go home feeling that you have wasted your time”. So said one of the Citizens Advice District volunteers on being asked about the rewards of his role.

CA Leiston relies on volunteer advisers to provide the advice service used every year by hundreds of East Suffolk people. Without volunteers there would be no service.

And now CA Leiston is putting out a call to would-be volunteers. Whatever your background, education and experience, you have a wealth of valuable talent which can be harnessed to help and advise in a truly immediate way.

Spend a morning in the Leiston office and you will be confronted with a vast array of issues: spiralling debt, family and relationship breakdown, distraught victims of fraud, confused benefit claimants, employment problems, consumer problems, housing problems. These are just a few of the many questions brought to the office each week. Our advisers are not expected to know all the answers, or indeed any, off the top of their heads. New volunteers take part in a training programme which over a period of time teaches them to use the CA data base, an information system managed and used by CA throughout the country. The trick is not to KNOW the answers, but to know how to find them.

The training is delivered in small groups and includes home study and observing advice sessions. Our trainees get experience in interviewing techniques and in recording advice on the secure data system and, crucially, they learn how to interrogate the advice system.

All would-be volunteers need to bring to the service is an inquiring mind, a non-judgemental approach to others and a desire to be of practical help to all those who come to CA. They are asked to commit on average one day a week to the service.

The rewards are great. Volunteers really do make a difference every time they are on duty. They are part of a committed band of individuals who are drawn from all walks of life and who bring and share a wealth of experience. Young, older, working and retired they all have one goal and that is to focus their talents where they can be most useful. And they make friends while working in a disciplined office environment.

Each Citizens Advice is an independent charity dependent on local fund raising and local authority grants. Volunteers are needed not just to deliver advice, but to fund raise, to help with administration and to join the trustee board.

CA Leiston, Saxmundham and District also has a small number of paid staff consisting of a full-time manager, two part-time assistant managers, a part-time money advice specialist and a money advice assistant and an outreach organiser. The main office in Leiston is open from 10 am to 2pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. It operates Outreach sessions, conducted by volunteers, in Woodbridge, Wickham Market, Framlingham, Saxmundham and a number of the smaller villages.
