## Dear Friends

When October arrives and days begin to shorten, one of my regular warning signs will 'light up'. It's almost time to stop, rest and recover, to begin my personal preparation for Advent during a week of silence in a Benedictine monastery just outside Brugge. And the countdown has begun. This year will be my 9<sup>th</sup> annual visit to a place that calls me. A place where food and beds may be basic with bathrooms at the end of a very long corridor, and my allocated room always seemingly at the furthest end, so that if one needs to get up in the night, you are sure to be wide awake when you get back to your bed! Though that doesn't usually cause a problem, as it is easy in the silence of the early hours, in that place, to simply know yourself to be in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ who is also awake and ready to just listen or to speak the words you need to hear.

Because a retreat or two a year are good for me personally, I think everyone needs to find a 'soul place', somewhere to visit, if only for a day or even for a few hours. Somewhere that encourages you to pray, somewhere that will heal, restore and refresh you. So that just as on a car dash board we don't ignore a red warning light, especially if it's flashing, so we should not ignore our body's or mind's warning signs; difficulty in sleeping, feeling stressed, bad tempered, or just simply worrying about something, or maybe drinking more than is usual - all warning signs – there for a reason and not to be ignored. Retreats then, in my opinion, are good for body, mind and soul, and they don't have to be in another country, or a week long, nor even of the silent variety in order to do you good and turn red lights back to green.





## **Tax Scam**

Currently doing the rounds is an email tax scam. It advises you that you have a tax rebate. It asks you to follow a link to give details. Ignore it; HMRC will never use texts or emails to tell you about a tax rebate or penalty. Even better, forward the email to [phishing@hmrc.gsi.gov.uk](mailto:phishing@hmrc.gsi.gov.uk) who will try and track down the perpetrators.

## **Passwords**

Hackers can use your email to gain access to all your personal accounts, leaving you vulnerable to identity theft or fraud.

### **Make your passwords stronger with three random words**

To create a strong password simply choose three random words.

Numbers and symbols can still be used if needed. However, using three random words is the key to creating a strong password.

Never use any word which is related to you and may be easy to guess, for example by looking at your social media pages.

Absolutely never use:

- Pet's name
- Other family members' names
- Favourite holiday
- Current partner's name
- Child's name
- Place of birth
- Something related to your favourite sports team.

Your most important accounts are your email and online banking.

With access to your email, hackers can take control of all your online accounts by asking for the password to be reset and using the information your email contains can easily be pieced together to create a profile of your identity.

## **Telephones and Power Cuts**

In the event of a power cut, portable phones in the home that require a power source will not work. It is advisable to have at least one corded phone in the house which will work without the need for electricity. This is especially important in areas where mobile reception is weak.

## VILLAGE HALL



### **END OF AN ERA...**

VHMC have been given formal notice, that after 41 years, Easton Pre-School are to leave the Village Hall with effect from 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2016. They have exercised their right to initiate the break clause in the 10-year lease signed with VHMC as part of the 2010 refurbishment project agreement.

The good news is they will be staying in the village and relocating to Easton Farm Park. This is a positive move for the Pre-School as they can continue to offer pre-school provision in the village and in a lovely setting for the children. We wish them continued success for the future.

The consequences of this change on the management of the village hall may, on the surface, seem dramatic as in the last 6 years they have accounted for 50% of our total user group income and account for over £4000 income a year. However, they also account for over 70% of our variable running costs. So although we expect to see an obvious drop in income for the rest of this financial year, equally we expect a large drop in running costs. We will continue to monitor the financial impact of them leaving and report back at our AGM next May.

### **A GREAT OPPORTUNITY...**

The Pre-School's news does give residents and potential new daytime user groups a new opportunity to increase the variety of activities available to residents during the day time. We have already been talking to a number of local interest groups about coming to the hall and are optimistic we will bring some to the hall in the next few months. From November onwards we will be able to offer all day Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursday and Fridays to other groups or activities that we have not been able to do before.

If you have a particular hobby, interest or activities that you feel would suitable for the village hall then please let us know. Other halls have; art clubs; dancing groups; gardening clubs; photography groups; whist drives; coffee mornings; book clubs; other forms of keeping fit ... the list is endless!

Call me on 747366 if you wish to be involved in organising activities or have other ideas on daytime user groups that could be run and supported at the hall.

# Easton Primary School



Back to school! The children are back from their summer break and have already settled in well to the new term. We welcome 11 new reception children in Pirate Class. They have made new friends and are having a great time. We also have 4 new pupils in other year groups who have also settled in well. We all welcome two new members of staff - Mrs Helen Murray, our new Assistant Principal, and Miss Cat Rivera who will be teaching Aztec Class. Both teachers have moved from our other schools in the Academy. We welcome them to Easton and hope they are enjoying their new school.

At Easton our children are put into four house teams - Jade, Lightning, Crimson and Amethyst. They earn team points for a variety of reasons and aim to win the trophy at the end of term and a reward. The children enjoy finding out on a Friday morning who is in the lead. Each team is led by a year 6 pupil who encourages the younger children to earn team points and praises their team whenever possible.

We began the term with our annual welcome coffee morning to our new parents and their families. We combined this with the Macmillan coffee morning to raise money for a great cause. Thank you to all those attended. Year 5 and 6 are off to Derbyshire this month for their annual residential trip. Some of the activities will include a visit to the village of Eyam, Chatsworth House, Heights of Abraham (cable car ride), rock climbing, and abseiling and hill walking. We hope they have a wonderful time and some great memories are made.

Every child at Easton continues to participate in Yoga. We have found this beneficial for the children (and staff!) and enjoy watching the children relax and prepare themselves for learning.

Pirate Class are learning about famous explorers such as Neil Armstrong and Christopher Columbus. In geography the children will be learning about our capital city. In science they will be finding out about mini-beasts (always a favourite!) As always we will be out and about for enrichment purposes so if you see us in the village do stop us to say hello!

In Aztec Class the children are learning about the water cycle in science and in history they will be finding out about the Romans, including holding their own Roman day.

The children in year 2 have started their recorder lessons and from what I can hear (I'm next door!) are doing very well.

In Unicorn Class the children have been learning a lot about Derbyshire in preparation for their residential trip. This included the plague (linked with the village of Eyam), and the geography of the county including similarities and differences with Suffolk.

So plenty of learning taking place in all three classes.

If you have any expertise in any areas of the curriculum we would love to hear from you. We always welcome visitors to the school as part of our enrichment programme. We would particularly like to hear from you if you play an instrument and would play to the children in an assembly (just a one off, so no commitment needed). I know you're out there!



We will be walking down to the church for our Harvest Festival celebrations with a theme of water this year to raise money for Water Aid and you are very welcome to join us at the church to hear stories, poems and songs from the children. 

# WHAT TO DO IN THE VEGETABLE AND FRUIT GARDEN IN OCTOBER

As Wellie Boots is apparently on holiday at the time of writing and, by his own admission, he does not grow fruit and veg, I thought it might be useful to take a look at 'things to be done' if you do grow them. So here goes, with a little help from the internet! Ed.

## Composting



Although most spent organic materials from the flower garden can be placed on the compost heap, when it comes to vegetables there are several items that should NOT be put on the compost heap. The most important category to avoid are the remains of plants which contain soil pests such as carrot fly and cabbage root fly and soil-borne diseases such as club root of brassicas. Any vegetation that is known, or thought, to be suffering from any of the above should be either burnt on the bonfire or put in the dustbin. If added to the compost heap, there is always the risk that the pests and diseases will survive and attack again next year. Another potential problem is weeds, which, unless the compost heap reaches a high enough temperature, can still set seed.

## Potatoes and Root Vegetables

Lift main crop potatoes by the middle of the month. Dig them up carefully, lay them out to dry, and store them in large paper sacks (Rackhams at Wickham Market sell them) in a cold, dark, frost-free place. One important point with all root crops is that when lifting them you must be very careful not to stick the fork through them. Any damaged ones should be used up quickly or they will rot.



## Vegetable Seeds to Sow this month

A final sowing of lettuce can be made in frames in the first half of the month to give a supply in the spring. Choose a hardy variety.

## Vegetables to Plant in October

Spring cabbage plants should be planted out in their final positions as soon as possible, if not already done. If left any later, they may fail to make good plants by the onset of winter.

## The Fruit Garden in October

It is now almost at the end of the fruit season, with the final pickings of apples, pears, perpetual strawberries, late blackberries and autumn-fruiting raspberries. It is never wise to leave even the latest ripening varieties of apple and pear on the trees after the middle of the month as they face being blown down by gales.



Decide what new trees, bushes and canes you would like to grow so that they can be bought in good time and planted out before the weather is too cold or wet.

### **General Hygiene**

All fruits which have fallen should be gathered up, no matter why they fell. In many cases, apples, pears and plums drop prematurely because they may contain maggots of the codling moth and the red plum maggot. Both will crawl from the fallen fruit, after a few days, and into the ground to pupate.

Fallen leaves may also be carrying fungal diseases, principally apple and pear scab and mildew, from many fruits. If there is much evidence of this, sweep up the leaves and burn them to prevent infecting new growth next spring. When pruning later on, always be on the lookout for mildewed shoots and canker. Quite good control can be had by cutting them out in winter.

Grease bands should be applied without delay as many of the pests the bands are designed to catch will already be leaving the trees.

### **Strawberries and Raspberries**



Strawberries can be kept fruiting longer protecting them with cloches or polythene tunnels. However, remember to ventilate whenever it is warm and/or sunny. Fungal diseases are rife this late in the year and thrive in the close atmosphere under cloches and tunnels.

Autumn raspberries can also be protected from the cold weather with polythene sheeting as and when necessary.

### **Pruning Fruit Bushes**

Finish pruning blackberries and hybrid cane fruits, such as loganberry, this month and tie the new canes in to take the place of the fruited ones cut out previously.

Although blackberries are hardy, some of the hybrids (such as loganberry and tayberry), are not entirely hardy. Therefore, tie the new canes of tender varieties into a bundle to protect them, and fasten this to the wires over winter. Remember to cut them loose and train in the canes next March, before growth starts. Start pruning bush fruits when the leaves have begun to fall around late October or November.




