## From Revd Graham Hedger

Over the summer I had the opportunity to read some social history relating to the churches in this area. I always find it fascinating to find out what was going on; the issues that got people hot under the collar and also how different parishes were in the pastoral care of clergy. Times change and many of the things that seemed revolutionary at the time are now taken for granted.

One of the interesting things that I have found in my time in Suffolk is how forward thinking the church can be. In the 1970s, Bishop Leslie Brown created the role of 'elder', a lay person with some basic training who could minister with clergy in pastoral work and taking services. It was seen as revolutionary. In this diocese we currently have around 500 elders working in parishes. In this benefice we have been fortunate to have many elders in the past and to be served by an excellent group of people at this time. I hope that the number will increase in the years to come. Many other dioceses, some 40 years on, are now looking at such schemes. Bishop Martin recently ordained a large number of people who have been through a totally different pathway of training. Many had experienced a 'call' to ministry many years ago, but circumstances prevented them responding. Just another example of how innovation starts in Suffolk.

Over the coming months the church councils will be looking at what God is calling us, as individual parishes and as a group of churches, to do. We are stronger together than as individual parishes. It is always a case of finding the appropriate way of developing ministry. There are many things that we do where it is appropriate to do them at parish level. However, there are other things where we are stronger doing them together. For instance, our elders work across the benefice providing vital ministry. Also the monthly benefice service with a choir and a slightly more formal liturgy offers us the opportunity to worship in a way that we can't do in separate parishes. Why not come and experience it?

It is my hope and prayer that, building on all the good work in recent years, we can continue to work together responding to the call of God that we might minister effectively in an ever-changing situation.

## Easton Scam

A resident has reported the following:

“Today we received a phone call from 01813216299 and purporting to be from BT. The recorded voice was female with an American accent and said that our landline and broadband were compromised and we should press 1 to get help. We didn’t do that and I contacted BT who confirmed it was a scam and they have blocked the number for us.”

## Fake TV Licensing Refund Emails

(Issued by Action Fraud 21st September 2018)

Fraudsters are sending out fake TV Licensing refund emails that lead to convincing looking websites in a bid to steal victims’ bank account details.

There have been over 100 reports about these scam emails in the past few days that appear to have been constantly evolving.

They claim that TV Licensing have been trying to get hold of recipients regarding an overpayment refund, or that due to invalid account details a credit was not possible.

The refund links lead to cloned TV Licensing websites that are designed to harvest bank account and credit card details.

## TV Licensing’s tips for spotting a scam email :

- **Check the email contains your name** – TV licensing will always include your name in any emails they send you.
- **Check the email subject line** - anything along the lines of "Action required", "Security Alert", "System Upgrade", "There is a secure message waiting for you", and so on, should be treated as suspect.
- **Check the email address** - does the email address look like one that TV Licensing use? For example I donotreply@tvlicensing.co.uk. Look closely as often the address may be similar.
- **Check for a change in style** - often the scammers will take the real emails and amend them. Look out for changes in the wording used, especially if it seems too casual or familiar.

- **Check for spelling and grammar** - are there any spelling mistakes, missing full stops or other grammatical errors?
- **Check the links go to the TV Licensing website** - hover over the links in the email with your mouse to see their destination and check the web address carefully. If you are not sure, go directly to the TV Licensing website.
- **Never provide details by email** - TV Licensing will never ask you to reply to an email and provide bank details or personal information.

# Easton Primary School

Back to school! The children are back from their summer break and have already settled in well to the new term. We welcome 15 new reception children in Caterpillar Class. They have made new friends and are having a great time. We all welcome a new member of staff, Mr Ollie Payne, who is the class teacher for Crocodile Class, and Miss Cat Rivera returns from her maternity leave to join Mrs Box to teach Warrior Class. We welcome them all to Easton and hope they are enjoying their new school.

At Easton our children are put into four house teams: Jade, Lightning, Crimson and Amethyst. They earn team points for a variety of reasons and aim to win the trophy at the end of term and a reward. The children enjoy finding out on a Friday morning who is in the lead. Each team is led by a year 6 pupil who encourages the younger children to earn team points and praises their team whenever possible.

We began the term with our annual welcome coffee morning to our new parents and their families. We combined this with the Macmillan Coffee Morning to raise money for a great cause. Thank you to all those attended.

Years 5 and 6 went to Derbyshire for their annual residential trip. Some of the activities included a visit to the village of Eyam, Chatsworth House, Heights of Abraham (cable car ride), rock climbing, and abseiling and hill walking. They had a wonderful time and some great memories were made.

Every child at Easton continues to participate in Yoga. We have found this beneficial for the children (and staff!) and enjoy watching the children relax and prepare themselves for learning.

Caterpillar Class are learning about fairy tales and this has been a cross curricular topic for the first few weeks in school. In geography the children will be learning about our capital city. In science they will be exploring materials; again this is linked to fairy tales such as the three little pigs' houses. As always we will be out and about for enrichment purposes, so if you see us in the village do stop us to say hello!

In Crocodile Class the children are learning about the Stone Age - always popular! The children in Year 2 have started their recorder lessons and from what I can hear (I'm next door!) are doing very well.

In Warrior Class the children were learning a lot about Derbyshire in preparation for their residential trip. This included the plague (linked with the village of Eyam), and the geography of the county including similarities and differences to Suffolk.

So plenty of learning taking place in all three classes.

If you have any expertise in any areas of the curriculum we would love to hear from you. We always welcome visitors to the school as part of our enrichment programme. We would particularly like to hear from you if you play an instrument and would play to the children in an assembly (just a one off, so no commitment needed) I know you're out there!

We will be walking down to the church for our Harvest Festival celebrations and once again will be collecting for a local food bank. You are very welcome to join us at the church to hear stories, poems and songs from the children.

## A short history of Stud Farm, Easton

Copied from notes hand-written  
by the late W D Akester, village historian.

Thought to have been built by Alexander, the 10th Duke of Hamilton and Brandon in the year 1850.

According to Whites Directory 1885 :

120 horses were in the village stud, breeding 30 to 40 race-horses ,amongst which were **Strathavon** - winner of 45 races, **Fiddler** which beat the famous American horse Foxall in 1882, **Shifnal** - winner of 19 races, and **Barbillon**. He also had a magnificent stud of Suffolk cart-horses, consisting of 5 stallions (1st prize horses) and 12 of the best mares in the Kingdom.

**1919** Sold by The Duchess and bought with Martley Hall for £11,000.

Sold in **1920** to the Vesty family for £22,000.

Other owners:

**1929 – 1937** George Jennings & Alfred Jennings

**1940 – 1958** Whitworth

**1958 – 1979** Colin Walker

**1979 – 1996** Gibson

**1996 -** Murland

Consisting of 7 acres with buildings mainly of red brick and pantiles.

## The Story of a Mission : Part 2

**We are indebted to Malcolm MacNicol for this fascinating insight to a 2nd World War bombing mission from Parham.**



B17 Flying Fortress

“The big ship lumbered out onto the perimeter track, our Ground Crew waving us off as we joined the queue to the runway. Their job was done until our return. Taking off has its thrills, and we all breathed a little easier as the wheels lifted off the runway and tucked themselves into the nacelles. While our pilot spent the long period of forming with the other aircraft, there was nothing for the rest of us to do except check everything again and try to prevent thoughts turning to the next eight hours or so.

About two hours after take off we were in Division Formation with Aldeburgh beneath us as we left England behind us – perhaps it wasn’t such a bad place after all! White puffs of smoke appeared from the guns of nearby aircraft as gunners test fired, and at a word over the intercom from our navigator, we did the same. Then nothing to do but wait, fiddle and think – always thinking. A few attempts at light conversation over the intercom to ease the mounting tension broke the waiting until our front gunner called up “Dutch coast coming up” and skipper cautioned us to keep alert, watch for fighters, and to sing out when our own fighter escort showed up. Navigator chipped in “Should be two groups of Mustang P51s in 16 minutes”. From this altitude, 20,000ft and climbing, the sun was well up and the air cold and sharp, although I didn’t realise it in my heated suit. I watched my assigned area of sky until my eyes ached. The intercom crackled. Someone up front called “Fighters two o’clock high”.

## Out and About ...

### Ticket machine at the Station

On Friday 14th September 2018, Greater Anglia installed a ticket machine under the canopy on the station platform; a happy end to a campaign to see one reinstated that began in 2012. You can collect pre-paid tickets, apply railcard and/or season ticket discounts and plan both on-the-day or future journeys with the same benefits as online services, or so we are told. It takes card-only payment, but has a contactless facility for payments under £30. Each new ticket machine along the line has its own router, to avoid a knock-on impact if machines at neighbouring stations fall out of service. It uses touchscreen technology, and if needed, anyone can press a button for assistance that will connect the user with a real person in Norwich (not India) who can remote in and help you purchase your ticket(s) of choice.
