From Revd Graham Hedger

As I write this, the combines are out in force, the lanes are filled with tractors and trailers hauling off their valuable cargo. It depends who you talk to and which field they are in as to how a farmer will speak about the harvest. For some the winter crops have been very good, but the spring crops not so good, and for those who have livestock it has been a challenging summer. Throughout the benefice we will celebrate harvest festival from mid September through to mid October, which recognises that harvest is a prolonged affair and also that as a benefice we have to spread some things out across many Sundays.

This year has made us aware of the dependence we have on factors that are outside our control. Technology and experience are important in today's agriculture, but at the end of the day we are reliant on factors outside our control, namely the weather. So gathering for harvest festivals this year may be a greater cause of celebration than usual. For people in our sister diocese of Kagera in Tanzania, it has been not just one year but several years of poor rainfall and therefore poor harvests. For that reason, last year Bishop Martin launched an appeal in Lent for funds to support our sisters and brothers. The appeal raised over £50,000 and the money has been routed through TEAR Fund (a major church based relief organisation) and is being used on a number of projects in partnership with the diocese. I've been mindful of environmental issues for much of my life, but it wasn't until around the year 2000 that I attended my first detailed briefing about climate change. It seemed a doomsday scenario. If anything has changed, it is that the predictions get worse. For many years churches around the world have used the 'Marks of Mission' to describe their task. The fifth Mark is 'to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew life on earth'. For people of all faiths and none, this is an issue that won't go away and challenges us about how our lifestyle impacts on the world around us and future generations. Each one of us can make a difference, harvest is an opportunity to take stock and re dedicate ourselves to the task.



Easton Scams

Two residents have reported attempted scams.

The first was regarding a threatening message supposedly from HMRC saying that tax had been under paid for four years and they were going to be taken to court. Our resident has kindly provided an extract from Taxvol.org who provide tax advice for the elderly.

“Scam Warning: Phone message threatens HMRC lawsuit. HMRC has asked us to alert our users to a scam which targets taxpayers and seems to be aimed at the elderly in particular. We have been asked to share the following information:

There is currently a telephone scam where a recorded message is left, allegedly from HMRC, stating that HMRC are bringing a lawsuit against the individual and is going to sue them. The recipient is asked to phone a number and speak to the officer dealing with the case. This scam is becoming widely reported and seems to be targeting older people. Please do not reply to the message. HMRC takes security very seriously but you need to be alert. If you cannot verify the identity of the person making the call you should not disclose your personal details. You should report these incidents on the Action Fraud website, or you can call them on 0300 123 2040.”

The second was a PayPal scam where the email stated that the account was about to be suspended and asked our resident to confirm their details. The interesting thing about this was that the logo and layout mimicked the true PayPal with incredible accuracy. However, whilst initially hidden, the email address was far from the real thing. No matter how plausible the email looks, always check the email address it has come from. If you are in doubt about it, go to the PayPal website and check direct.

Redirection Scam

I have previously highlighted this scam but it is on the increase and can involve large amounts of money. A bank has recently issued this advice due to their concerns.



What is a payment redirection scam?

This is a type of scam where you're typically sent an email asking you to set up a payment to a new account or to amend existing account details. Sometimes these requests come out of the blue, but they often come from someone you're already in contact with, such as a builder or solicitor.

Emails, text messages and telephone numbers can be spoofed, so they're made to look genuine. In the case of emails, they can even be sent from a genuine email account that's been hacked. So when you're asked to make a payment to a new account, the account belongs to the fraudster, and the money never arrives with the genuine person or business.

Key advice to avoid this scam

Always confirm any instruction to make a payment to a new account or change existing account details directly with the person or company requesting the change.

Don't reply to the message or use the contact details included in it, until you've checked it's genuine. The advice is to check the request a different way. You could use the contact details that you already have on any correspondence you've previously received, or you could contact the company or individual on a publicly available number, such as one published on a website. If you think you've been a victim of a fraud or a scam, or are concerned that you may have revealed personal or security details or information, contact your bank immediately.

How long have you lived in Easton?

15 years

Why did you move here?

I had the opportunity to transfer from the London Ambulance service to the East of England service, plus my wife Jenny, as a teacher, could also work in this part of the world - somewhere we had visited many times before as her parents and sister live in Suffolk. My granddad was also born in Lowestoft so I can claim some family history here!

What's your favourite thing about living here?

The scenery, the people and, strangely, the dark—it took a while getting used to no street lights but I love the lack of light pollution. Getting home at sometimes three in the morning after a shift, on a clear night, the stars really do look incredible.

What's your *least* favourite thing about living here?

Hard to think of one, but if pushed, I'd say the nearby cockerel needs to reset his morning alarm—having to keep our windows closed during the hot spell or be woken at about four-thirty every morning was a tough choice, but that's the country life for you!

What's the most interesting job you've ever had and why?

I think the job I've done for more than 20 years - a paramedic in the Ambulance Service - is the most satisfying and stimulating. You never know what's coming next. I've delivered babies, dealt with people having major heart attacks and have been to some pretty difficult road traffic incidents. It's a job where you can make a difference, whether easing someone's pain with morphine, or just talking to people, often elderly, who are lonely and simply need a chat.

Have you ever lived in another country and if so, where and why?

I did go travelling from September 1989 to September 1990, and lived and worked in Sydney, Australia as a bellboy in a hotel—great tips, as well as driving the guests' cars! I met my wife Jenny while backpacking in New Zealand. I travelled over 11,000 miles and it turned out she came from Romford, an hour away from my home in Croydon!

If you could pass any law you would ...

Legalise euthanasia. Why people who are in agony and dying, often slowly, have to travel to Switzerland to die peacefully is beyond me. If you have religious reasons against it, fine, that's your choice. I'm not remotely religious and I would like the chance to end my life when I want to. If you want a caring society, pass this now.

Your greatest strength is ...

I think I am a good communicator and listener as well as being pretty empathetic.

Your greatest weakness is ...

Too much of a dreamer (I will do that motorcycle trip around the world ... one day).

Your favourite TV programme is ...

Anything with the legend that is Alan Partridge and, of course, Game of Thrones at present—plenty of violence and endless intrigue, what more could you ask for!

Your favourite book ever is ...

Philip Pullman's His Dark Materials series was brilliant, I'm currently reading the prequel book; plus I find James Ellroy excellent. He wrote LA Confidential and others set in the seedy side of Los Angeles in the 50's and 60's.

Your favourite place in the UK (other than Easton!) is ...

It's a close one between Cornwall, where we have just come back from holiday, and the Lake District where we often visit as my sister lives there. The lakes probably win as they are stunning and we have great memories of long walks, usually getting lost ...



FATAL FLORAL FOAM

In another earlier parish magazine in the benefice I attempted to clarify some of the anomalies of recycling and suggested Oasis is best avoided for flower arranging as it is NOT recyclable. It seems I should have been more emphatic, as it is amongst the very worst of pollutants.

It is popular because it is light, firm and retains water, BUT it is made of phenol-formaldehyde resin and can take centuries to break down. Worse, it crumbles and the debris is often washed down the sink, where it ends up as micro-particles in watercourses and oceans.

Philippa Craddock's magnificent floral decorations for Prince Harry's recent wedding were all Oasis free, so, with a little care it should be possible to avoid it in our churches. Smithers, the makers of Oasis, now produce Bio Floral Foam, but even this is only half bio-degradable. So far, they have not been able to find a better solution.

Jan Law of the National Association of Floral Artists, fully supported by the RHS says "It means going back to wiring and mossing." So please, flower ladies, do your best to keep our churches foam free. The beautiful displays you produce may not look quite so perfect, but what a difference you will make to the planet.

PS: Did you see the wonderful BBC4 programme on 'The history of waste' recently? It showed that in Belgium they are now opening up old landfill and re-cycling the contents!!

The Story of a Mission : Part 1



As space allows in this and future magazines, I hope to serialise the story of a typical bombing mission flown by 390 Bomb Group, US Air Force, from their base at Parham Airfield. It was recorded by Staff Sergeant Robert Mygatt, a mid-upper gunner in a B17F Flying Fortress, flying daylight bombing missions deep into Germany. Between July 1943 and May 1945 they flew 301 missions, losing 147 aircraft in action, and some 370 men killed. During the many battles they fought in the skies over enemy territory, they destroyed 378 enemy aircraft and another 78 probables. Of necessity I have condensed some of the domestic detail of Robert's story, but the action is as he wrote it, although I should apologise for 'translating' some Americanisms!

"It had been raining when we turned in early last evening, but now, as we were shaken awake at 01.45, it was as damp and dark as only an English night can be in the blackout. Although heavily overcast, thankfully the rain had stopped as we climbed aboard the trucks waiting to take us to the mess hall and breakfast. Living in the present, day by day, hour by hour, sometimes minute by minute, breakfast was a time to savour, before facing the first climax of any mission – the briefing. In the stomach-churning few minutes waiting for the sombre black curtain to be drawn aside from the big briefing map, we learned where we were going today, and the opposition we were likely to face.

"Today, 28 May 1943, we were to attack the synthetic oil plant at Magdeburg deep in central Germany, where attacks were always bitterly opposed – a penetration to be dreaded by every one of us taking part. Now, the Intelligence Officers were giving their part of the briefing, the name of the target, its identity and importance, going over the route out and back,

the bomb run, the number of AA guns and fighter opposition, timings, and what to do in emergencies. Then the Ops Officer carefully went over altitudes, expected weather, our fighter escort and our RV with it. Questions were asked and answered until everyone was satisfied that no stone had been left unturned. We gunners filed out, leaving our Radio Operators for a few minutes' extra briefing on frequencies and codes to be used.

"The Ground Crew were already on hand at our hardstand, checking instruments, equipment and pre-flighting the engines of our Fort, with the armourer assisting as necessary with the dozen .50 heavy machine guns we carried. An oxygen truck backed up to us to check our oxygen supplies, and the fuel truck topped up our fuel tanks. Meanwhile the turret specialist, making the rounds of the planes assigned to him, asked for any malfunctions of our power turrets while we gunners stripped, cleaned and oiled our guns and ordnance men checked our ammunition. Our bomb load had been taken aboard overnight, and now the bombs, loaded, fused and safetyed (sic) hung silently from the racks in our bomb-bay. Our pilot sat in the tent alongside, in close conversation with the crew chief, making out Form 1, the document we left behind as a record in case we didn't come back. Now all was in readiness. The last truck lumbered away. The big ship standing quietly in the pre-dawn darkness, as if resting, harbouring its strength for the mighty effort to come. The first flush of dawn paled the eastern sky and it was time to start engines. The nine men who were to fly her climbed aboard the battle wagon, adjusting their flying clothes. The pilot and co-pilot started the four 1200hp Wright Cyclone engines one by one, while the rest of the crew donned Mae Wests and parachutes, each man checking the equipment that might save his life later on. Soon the mighty roar of a hundred and sixty engines filled the early morning air. It was time to go."


