GEORGE READ



George was born in Earl Soham on December 16th 1934. The family moved from Earl Soham to Kettleburgh for a short time and then on to Hollowtree Cottage at Stud Farm in Easton. Sadly George's mum died when he was 10 so George's father, Charles, bought him and his two brothers up on his own.

George hated school, first at Earl Soham, briefly at Kettleburgh, then Easton School before moving on to senior school in Framlingham. He would often engineer a puncture or broken chain on his bike so he couldn't get there! After leaving school, and a brief spell working for Peter Smith at Home Farm, Glevering, George went to Aldershot to start his National Service in the Army Catering Corps. Hazel was his pen pal during his time in the Sudan and when he returned home, they started going out together. They married in Easton Church in February 1958.

George went to work for Kenny and Jean Clarke at Letheringham Hall after leaving the army, and he and Hazel moved in to Brickle's Cottage after they were married. They had two children, Michael and Shirley, and brought them up in Letheringham. After working at Letheringham Hall for 37 years, George and Hazel moved to Easton where he went to work for the Kerr family.

George was a very keen gardener and was happy to share his knowledge and his produce. He was also a sportsman, playing football, as well as cricket at Easton, and with his brothers they used to move the sheep off the pitch back into the park on a Friday night to get the pitch ready for games at the weekend! In later years bowling became his passion and he was a long serving member of Easton Bowls Club where he was part of numerous club successes. There are many photos of him in the clubhouse. George was competitive, but was always incredibly gracious in defeat, a trait so often lacking today in the modern sporting world.

Above all, George was a family man and was extremely proud of his children and grandchildren. After retirement he and Hazel moved to Wickham Market and George was, sadly, diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. Hazel cared for him for many years until it became too difficult for her and he went to live at Mills Meadow care home in Framlingham. Hazel passed away in August 2013 and George mourned his soul mate.

He will be missed by all whose lives he touched ... and brightened as a result of being there, but none more so than his family. George was a sportsman, a countryman and an out and out family man.

Our thoughts and prayers are with his family.

HIGHLIGHTS – MEETING MONDAY 17th AUGUST

- The Acting Clerk ceased duties on 8th July. The vacancy for a Parish Clerk is being advertised.
- The Chair is carrying out Clerk and RFO essential duties for the interim until a new Clerk is appointed.
- The Chair has reconciled the bank account and produced the Financial Statement and Budget which was discussed and agreed.
- The Chair and Cllr Parkinson reported on the state of the village pavement on the Deben side of the road from opposite the school to the Hunt Kennels, following reports of concern. Council decided to write to East Area Highways and report the poor state of repair giving notice of the risks.
- The Parish Council agreed to appoint SCL land management (grass cutting etc) contractors to cut the grass and manage for the cemetery and play area.
- Cllr Parkinson reported on Speedwatch, following 5 x 30 to 45 minute sessions 463 vehicles were observed, over 6 sessions 2 vehicles were recorded above 35 mph.

All details and documents are on the Planning Portal at SCDC. There will be a public open session to enable residents to ask questions to the Applicant. The meeting will be for the Parish Council to formulate a response to SCDC.

Appeal – Hopkins Homes – Land Adjacent Easton Primary School DC/14/2244/FUL- Provision of 10 open market dwellings and 4 affordable dwellings etc.

The Appeal is by Hopkins to the Planning Inspectorate with regard to the determination of this planning application by SCDC which was 'Refusal' earlier this year. Full details are yet to be received. SCDC have published the initial Appeal details on their Planning Portal. Following the receipt of details the Parish Council will convene a meeting accordingly.

Wellie Boots for September

Well, having arrived home earlier this morning from “me ‘olidays”, I’ve just realised that Wellie Boots is already several days overdue. Frightening how the days fly by as you are getting older, but not quite so bad as it was in September 1752 when the whole country lost 11 days. There were riots in towns and cities throughout the land demanding the return of their “lost” eleven days, fearing they were going to die eleven days earlier. No, Delilah, I don’t remember it, smartie-pants, but there is no British History between 3rd and 13th September 1752, so there. Fact. Tell you why next month – may come in useful for one of your trivia quizzes.

And, as you all know, 29th September is Michaelmas day, named after my namesake. On this day yonks and yonks ago, St Michael discovered the Devil hiding in Heaven and promptly kicked him out. But as he fell from the sky hollering and screaming, he landed in a bramble bush. Straightaway he cursed the fruits of that prickly plant, scorching them with his fiery breath, stamping and spitting on them and generally making them unfit for human consumption. The Devil renews his curse annually on Michaelmas Day and that is why it’s very unlucky to gather blackberries after this date. But make the most of them before then as they are absolutely delicious, especially when cooked with apples to create yet another free tasty dessert. Yummy!!



Talking of free meals reminds me of another story I know I have told before, but brought back fond memories to other people in the village as well. As a kid many years ago, I well remember often spending a couple of hours sheltering from the sweltering sun under a recently erected stook of corn, quaffing on a bottle of “pop” or barley water, and stuffing ourselves with stale sandwiches. All the village boys would be eagerly watching as the binders, sails flailing and whirling, gradually came to the end of their job. Then the rabbits would run, possibly even a hare, hotly pursued by us lads with our dogs – many a tasty free meal was forthcoming during harvest. Alas no more. Whether it is because people are more affluent (as undoubtedly they are), ‘elf and safety, or myxomatosis I know not, but it is a sight we will sadly never see again.



Now would be an excellent time to start making your own compost, perhaps by buying your own composter with a ground-level access door to remove the compost as it matures. In the next few weeks there will a surfeit of suitable plant materials as we slip into autumn and annual and perennial plants start to fade away (having first removed all cuttings you need from the perennials). It is essential to replace the goodness in our soil and autumn produces quantities of garden waste that will produce invaluable organic richness to put back into your soil for next spring. A good mix of ingredients is essential and I add grass clippings (not too much or it overheats or turns to unpleasant sludge) and a good amount of shredded paper products, even cardboard. However, NEVER add diseased or pest-ridden material as it will only lovingly nurture whatever villain you are to eliminate, nor add any woody stems. After the tomatoes and other greenhouse crops are finished, off to the compost bin with them, and thoroughly clean the greenhouse to prevent pests from making a home in that lovely warm environment. Then fumigate to get into all those tiny nooks and crannies where bugs just love to hide.

Many of you have managed to keep your containers or hanging baskets looking very healthy by constant deadheading and watering, but remember also that camellias, rhododendrons, azaleas and hydrangeas will abort next season's flowers if they are allowed to get too dry. With the ideal planting conditions of autumn (warm, moist soil) now is the time to plant container-grown shrubs, trees, fruit bushes, perennials, etc. The key to successful planting is to water in well. Soak the root ball in a bucket of water until no air bubbles come to the surface, dig the planting hole, fill with water and allow to drain away. Place the plant in the hole, fill with soil, firm gently and then water again with a watering can. This will give the plant a huge advantage over one planted with a dry root ball in a dry hole and watered only on the surface.

Finally, if you have planted any trees or shrubs in the last year or two on lawns or areas of rough grass, make sure they have a circle of clear earth around them – this MUST be kept clear or grass will prevent essential moisture getting through. Mulching with bark or compost will help to improve the situation considerably.

And so to bed – to catch up on my jet-lag and then the garden back-log.




